

PHASE I

PHASE II


- Heritage Hundred designations will be honored if paid in full by May 1, 2015.

The following items will be provided to Ninth District Life Members will be distributed by July 1, 2015.


- Life Members will receive a Ninth District Life Membership Plaque.


Ronald McNair – Innovative Astronaut

Each semester at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF), the office of Greek Life, an entity of the Division of Student Affairs at the University, calculates and publicizes the overall semester Grade Point Averages (GPA), as well as rank of Greek letter organizations based on their affiliations on a semester basis. At UAF, 7 of the "Divine 9" NPHC organizations are active, inclusive of: Alpha Phi Alpha, Alpha Kappa Alpha, Kappa Alpha Psi, Omega Psi Phi, Delta Sigma Theta, Phi Beta Sigma, and Zeta Phi Beta. For the Fall 2014 semester, the brothers of the Gamma Eta Chapter of Omega had the highest semester GPA among all NPHC organizations on campus. As these GPA calculations are important for consideration of University-related NPHC appointments, as well as individual chapter office designations, the Gamma Eta brothers' representation of "Scholarship" has put them in prime position to not only proliferate the ideals of Omega at UAF, but also to possibly be considered for leadership positions within the Greek system at UAF moving forward.



On May 20, 2014, Brotner Michael Thomas of St. Augustine's University (5-Spr. '13-Kappa Epsilon) began the Summer Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) Program in the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF). This 10-week program, sponsored through a grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) (www.nsf.gov) to UAF, had participants representing eight states, and one

foreign country. Brother Thomas selected to study protein biochemistry in the laboratory of Brother Dr. Paul D. Adams (5-Spr. '89-Theta Kappa; Louisiana State University) (Presently a member of Upsilon Chi Graduate Chapter in Northwest Arkansas), Associate Professor of



Chemistry and Biochemistry, and Cellular and Molecular Biology at UAF, who "readily consented" to serve as his faculty mentor for the summer program. Brothers Adams and Thomas originally began discussions on the possibility of Thomas coming to study in his laboratory in the summer of 2013 while networking at the 2013 International Leadership Conference in Kansas City, MO. Upon starting the research experience in the laboratory in 2014, the two worked together to get Brother Thomas started understanding the techniques in the Adams laboratory necessary for optimizing the purification of a Ras (Rat Sarcoma)-related protein from Escherichia coli cells so that it could undergo biochemical and biophysical study, fields in which Brother Adams has expertise in. In addition to his daily research

activities with Brother Dr. Adams, the REU program offered exciting opportunities for Brother Thomas such as weekly group meetings, and dinner/dialogues that covered topics on research, ethics, interviewing skills, and business dinner etiquette. Off-campus trips included travel to Devils Den State Park in Northwest Arkansas and a visit to Futurefuels, a company that develops, manufactures and markets chemicals and biofuels based in Batesville,



AR. At the conclusion of the program, there was a student poster "Symposium in Miniature" where Brother Thomas presented the results of his research with Brother Dr. Adams, followed by a luncheon for all student researchers and mentors. At St. Augustine's University, Brother Thomas

currently serves as President to the Student Government Association. He is also the Immediate Past Basileus of the Kappa Epsilon Chapter. Brother Dr. Adams serves as 9th District Advisor Overseer for the State of Arkansas, and as Co-Chairman of the International UG Chapter Advisors Committee for the fraternity.

What started off as casual conversation among an undergraduate and graduate brother a year before developed into a subsequent summer experience that neither brother is likely to ever forget because, through Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance, and Uplift, a "Lasting Bond" was created between a Mentor and Mentee...Brothers...Friends.


BROTHER HAS AWARD NAMED IN HIS HUNUK

One of the awards to be presented has been named in honor of Brother Dr. Lonnie R. Williams, currently Associate Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs at Arkansas State University.

The Dr. Lonnie R. Williams Lifetime Achievement Award will be bestowed upon a deserving alumna/alumnus of the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville who has made significant lifetime achievements in their personal, professional and community service. This is yet another culminating, yet humbling moment for Brother Williams, who, throughout his career in higher education, has made significant contributions to his community, state and nation. Prior to moving to Arkansas State University, his service to the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville included board of directors' positions for the Arkansas Alumni Association and the Black Alumni Society. He is currently a member of the Upsilon Chi Chapter of Omega in Northwest Arkansas and serves as Chapter Editor to the Oracle. He also serves Omega as State Representative-North, Arkansas. 

THE DOMINO EFFECT COMMENT LOANS by Dave Ramsey

When you were a kid, did you ever take the time to lay out a string of dominos, only to have one topple over before you were ready? All that work for nothing, and you were ready to scream.

That's a taste of the frustration that student loans can bring into your life. And much like those dominos, a school loan can knock stuff over in your life—and you'll be left to pick up the pieces.

Here's a quick breakdown...

The average student loan debt for bachelor's degrees in America has increased from \$15,073 in 1993 to \$27,547 in 2011. The approximate amount of outstanding student loan debt is \$1.1 trillion, and one in eight borrowers owes 50 grand or more. If you have trouble finding a job after graduating (and 13.3% of newbies are), Sallie Mae will still want to be paid. She's harder to get rid of than Glenn Close in Fatal Attraction.

Those numbers are just the surface though. Let's go deeper. When you have a student loan payment, whatever you are paying is money that can't work for you. It can hinder your ability to buy a house or start a

small busi-


even feel queasy about getting married or having kids. It stops you or slows you, and there is too much opportunity in life to be held back like that.

What good is it to graduate from school and take a \$35,000 job if you're \$25,000 in the hole from the getgo? It could very well take you 10 years to pay it back, and by the time that happens, a decade of your life has passed.

To put it another way...

Let's say you have a student loan payment of \$350 a month. If you graduate at 22 and spend 10 years paying the loan off, you can finally start investing that payment at 32. If you then invest that \$350 per month until age 65, you'll end up with \$1.6 million at 12% growth. Not bad, but far short of the \$5 million you would have had if you'd avoided debt and invested that \$350 a month starting at age 22. That student loan cost you more than \$3.4 million.

The sooner you get yourself out of debt (and student loans are often the biggest part of that), the sooner your situation gets better. You stop forking over interest, you get a big payment out of your life, and you have more money with which to save for emergencies and retirement, have fun, and give to those who are truly in need. Sallie Mae goes from being on your back to out the door.



LAMBDA ALPHA BROTHER DR. CLAUDE TELLIS RETIRES



After an illustrious career in the field of medicine, Dr. Claude J. Tellis of Baton Rouge, La. has called it a day. Dr. Tellis graduated from Southern University Laboratory School in Baton Rouge in 1962 as Valedictorian and President of the student council in high school. He then enrolled in Michigan State University where he pledged Sigma Chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. in 1964. He graduated from MSU in 1966 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Chemistry, as well as being a Distinguished Military Graduate. In 1966, Tellis entered Louisiana State University Medical School as the first African-American medical student. He became the first African-American to graduate from LSU Medical School in 1970, where he received the Bick Award, which is awarded to the most outstanding student in Psychiatry.

Tellis was accepted as an intern at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, DC, and served on active duty during that time. After receiving training in several medical fields and passing several state board examinations during the next few years, he held various positions within the ranks, became Chief of the Pulmonary Department until he retired from the US Army in 1989. He was promoted to full Colonel during this time, and received the Legion of Merit Award.

After he retired from the Army, Dr. Tellis returned to Baton Rouge. He came to Ochner Clinic as the Head of the Pulmonary Department, a position he held until he retired in December 2013. In 2007 he was named Physician of the Year of the Baton Rouge Region of Ochner Clinic. He



linked with Lambda Alpha Chapter in 1990, where he has since served the chapter well in various positions. He was twice named "Omega Man of the Year" by Lambda Alpha Chapter, and serves on numerous medical, civic, social, and church boards.

Dr. Tellis is married to the former Evelyn Robinson, and is the father of two children, Natalie and Claude, Jr. He is a member of Camphor United Methodist Church in Baton Rouge. His hobbies are reading, jogging, tennis, and photography.

Tet out of debt the same way you learned to walk

ABY STEP 1 - \$1,000 Emergency Fund

n emergency fund is for those unexpected events in life that you can't plan for: the loss of a job, i unexpected pregnancy, a faulty car transmission, and the list goes on and on. It's not a matter of if ese events will happen; it's simply a matter of when they will happen.

his beginning emergency fund will keep life's little Murphies from turning into new debt while you work if the old debt. If a real emergency happens, you can handle it with your emergency fund. No more borrowing. 's time to break the cycle of debt!

ABY STEP 2 - Pay off all debt using the Debt Snowball

st your debts, excluding the house, in order. The smallest balance should be your number one priority. Don't worry about terest rates unless two debts have similar payoffs. If that's the case, then list the higher interest rate debt first.

ne point of the debt snowball is simply this: You need some quick wins in order to stay pumped up about getting out of debt! Paying f debt is not always about math. It's about motivation. Personal finance is 20% head knowledge and 80% behavior. When you start tocking off the easier debts, you will see results and you will stay motivated to dump your debt.

ABY STEP 3 - 3 to 6 months of expenses in savings

nce you complete the first two baby steps, you will have built serious momentum. But don't start throwing all your "extra" money to investments quite yet. It's time to build your full emergency fund. Ask yourself, "What would it take for me to live for three to six onths if I lost my income?" Your answer to that question is how much you should save.

se this money for emergencies only: incidents that would have a major impact on you and your family. Keep these savings in a oney market account. Remember, this stash of money is not an investment; it is insurance you're paying to yourself, a buffer between you and life.

ABY STEP 4 - Invest 15% of household income into Roth IRAs and tax-advantaged retirement accounts

hen you reach this step, you'll have no payments—except the house—and a fully funded emergency fund. Now it's time to get serius about building wealth.

ave suggests investing 15% of your household income into Roth IRAs and pre-tax retirement plans. Don't invest more than that scause the extra money will help you complete the next two steps: college savings and paying off your home early.

'hy shouldn't you invest less than 15%? Some people choose to invest a small amount, if anything, because they want to get a child rough school or pay off the home in a hurry. But the kids' degrees won't feed you at retirement, and if you throw all your money into our mortgage at this point, you'll end up having to sell the house and buy the book 72 Ways to Prepare Alpo and Love It. Bad plan.

BABY STEP 5 - College funding for children

By this point, you should have already started Baby Step 4—investing 15% of your income—before saving for college. Whether you are saving for you or your child to go to college, you need to start now.

In order to have enough money saved for college, you need to have a goal. Determine how much per month you should be saving at 12% interest in order to have enough for college. If you save at 12% and inflation is at 4%, then you are moving ahead of inflation at a net of 8% per year!

Never save for college using:

Insurance
Savings bonds (only 5-6% growth)
Zero-coupon bonds. (only 6-8% growth)
Pre-paid college tuition (only 7% inflation rate)

The best way to save for college is with Education Savings Accounts (ESAs) and 529 plans. Remember, college is possible without loans!

BABY STEP 6 - Pay off your house early

Now it's time to begin chunking all of your extra money toward the mortgage. You are getting closer to realizing the dream of a life with no house payments.

As you attack this last debt, you will gain momentum much like you did back in the second step of the debt snowball. Remember, having absolutely no payments is totally within your reach!

BABY STEP 7 - Build wealth and give!

It's time to build wealth and give like never before. Leave an inheritance for future generations, and bless others now with your excess. It's really the only way to live!

Golda Meir says, "You can't shake hands with a clenched fist." Vow to never hold your money so tightly that you never give any awa Hoarding money is not the way to wealth. Save for yourself, save for your family's future, and be gracious enough to bless others. Yo can do all three at the same time.

Colonel Roosevelt Lewis Jr., one of the second generation airmen trained by the original Tuskegee airmen visited Lawton this weekend.

"If we want to go to the next level. If we want to achieve things. We have to have breakthroughs. So don't be afraid to be an individual who wants to learn how to fly or to be an entrepreneur in your community or to be a leader do not shy away from being a leader," said Colonel Roosevelt Lewis Jr., Second generation Tuskegee airmen.

Lewis was 16 when he joined the air force. He got his first flying lesson from Tuskegee airmen Alfred "Chief" Anderson known as the Father of Black Aviation.

"And then he turned and said hi I'm Chief Anderson would you like to go for a flight. My two buddies almost fell down backing up out of the way but he helped me in the airplane," Lewis said.

You could tell by the light in his eyes that moment when he first met his mentor was life changing. "He says alright it's saying it wants to fly. Ease the stick forward so the tail will come up. It did and my goodness I got very excited."

Lewis is now retired. Holding a long list of accomplishments including working in the Office of the Secretary of Defense. Also being voted best major in command by his

unit for four years. Now Lewis owns
Moton air field where he and most of the Tuskegee
airmen learned to fly. He hopes to pass on his knowledge
and experience to the next generation.



will live on for generations to come thanks to Lewis and his never-ending dedication to giving people the wings to take to the skies.

"The fact that these young eighteen to twenty-six year olds did the things that they did during that period of history in the forties it taught me that our young people can do an awful lot now. Do not give up on your dreams. Don't let anybody tell you that you can't do something."

Since retiring in 1991, Colonel Roosevelt Lewis Jr. has been training new pilots and three hundred of those have gone on to get their pilots license.



Dr. Charles Drew - Trailblazing Doctor

Dr. Drew is credited with perfecting the first blood transfusion and out of his work came the American Red Cross Blood Bank. This great accomplishment was awarded with a U.S. Postal stamp in 1981. He joined Omega Psi Phi in 1923 at Howard University and became the first African American to earn a Doctor of Science degree from Columbia University.



MANHOOD 101 MENTORING OUTREACH

According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, the black incarceration rate in state and federal prisons is 3,161 per 100,000 compared to the white incarceration rate of 487 per 100,000. The Brothers of Theta Chi Chapter in Houston, Tx asked the question: how can we hold our Black youth to a higher standard, raise the value of their reality and raise their expectations for the quality of their lives? The Chapter's response to this long existing crisis was the Manhood 101 Mentoring Outreach program. A program designed to help young black males learn to refuse to listen to their own excuses, demand integrity, commitment and persistence from themselves and others in all of their undertakings.

The Manhood 101 Mentoring Outreach program was created by Theta Chi due to the increasing sense of urgency concerning the lives of African American young men. The goal of the mentoring outreach is to align college educated professional African American mentors with at-risk high school students that exhibit a propensity to underachieve. The target students exhibit academic challenges, social issues and/or emotional deficiencies. However, the students



that enter into the program must be open-minded and aspire to better themselves first and foremost as young men, students, potential collegiate students and overall product citizens. The program aims to work in conjunction with the efforts of school officials and help to reduce juvenile delinquency, drug abuse, truancy, and other high-risk behaviors.

The 101 Mentoring Team effectively provides positive mentoring to young men enrolled in Greater Houston area high schools through the establishment of mutual trust, sharing of knowledge, coaching, modeling and meeting of clear and defined expectations. Approximately 15-20 participants are accepted into the program each year. Each student is assigned to at least one of the fraternity members as a primary mentor. Participants meet one Saturday per month as a group from 10am-1pm but have constant access to their primary mentor(s). Each monthly session is designed to address the specific needs of the students and covers the essentials of how to create a road map to success. The program coincides with the academic school year.

This outreach program achieves its goals thru means of mentoring. It employs positive males as the catalyst for open and honest discussions concerning daily trials, tribulations and obstacles faced by the young men and those to come in the near future as well as later in life. The program utilizes field based experiences that range from the high events like sports outings, historical sites, university campuses/classrooms and board rooms; to the low





events including detention rooms and jail cells. Lastly, the mentoring program provides opportunities for taking on leadership roles and responsibilities to establish creative thinkers, future leaders and positive role models. Theta Chi's program activities incorporate character building initiatives that instill confidence and demand personal growth along with providing the necessary tools to shape male youth leadership abilities.



On or about December 1, 2013, the brothers of the Theta Rho Chapter (Germany) of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. were informed that a member of their brotherhood,

Sergeant First Class Ernest Bower, was wounded during an attack while serving in Afghanistan as part of Operation Enduring Freedom and would arrive at the Landsthul Regional Medical Center (LRMC) via medical evacuation within a matter of hours for surgical treatment. LRMC is the largest and premier medical facility in the Department of Defense inventory located outside the continental United States and receives all service members wounded in Europe, the Middle East and Africa that require specialty care before returning to their units or transferring to a state-side facility for further treatment.

Without hesitation, the brothers utilized ingenuity and contacted chapter members who worked in and

within the vicinity of LRMC and devised a plan to ensure Bro. Bowers received the uplift and brotherly support that only a friend could give during such a turbulent time. Bro. Major Ryan Goodwin spearheaded the effort and coordinated with brothers Command Sergeant Major Anthony Robinson, Colonel Myron McDaniels and Technical Sergeant Bernard Edwards, who received Bro. Bowers and provided assistance during his preparation for surgery and the initiation of the rehabilitation process.

During his stay at LRMC, Bro. Bowers received a special visit from the Ambassador of the United States of America to Luxembourg, the Honorable Robert A. Mandell, who

was visiting other wounded Warriors. Theta Rho brothers managed to get Bro. Bowers out for a brief meeting regarding fundraising activities which he thoroughly enjoyed. He stated that the uplift provided by the Germany Ques not only helped him physically, but also emotionally, mentally and spiritually. Because his recovery went so well, Bro. Bowers was able to travel back to the United States in time to spend Christmas and New Year's Eve with his family.

Bro. Bowers is from Ridgeland, SC and served as a unit supply specialist. He recently retired from service on October 31, 2014 after serving 23 years honorably. During his tenure, he completed eight deployments with his most recent assignment being with the 163rd Military Intelligence Battalion. Bro. Bowers

is now transitioning into the civilian sector and reuniting with his family in Alabama where he stated he will continue to serve the community just as he did in Texas.

Bro. Bowers was initiated into the fraternity in 2009 through the Psi Phi Graduate Chapter in Winston Salem, NC and currently affiliated with Omicron Pi in Killeen, TX.

PSI ALPHA FATHERHOOD AND MENTORING

In 2012, the Schott Foundation for Public Education issued a report on the high school graduation rate for African American males in the United States. The report-titled "The Urgency of Now: The Schott 50 State Report on Public Education and Black Males," indicated that the national gap between white students and black students has only decreased 3 percentage points in the last 10 years. The author of the report states; "at this rate of progress, with no large scale system intervention, it would take another 50 years to close the graduation gap between Black males and their White counterparts." Although much progress has been made in decreasing the graduation rate for Black males, the persistent gap needs to be addressed. Researchers Cornell University studied the persistent gap between black and white students, but also looked at why African American males in particular continue to drop out of high school at a higher rate then their white counterparts. According to their research, two of the major reasons for the disparity is the lack of mentors and fathers absent from the home. The epidemic reached a national level when President Obama issued a challenge to communities across the nation when he started a National Conversation on Responsible Fatherhood and Strong Communities and made the issue of fatherhood and at-risk youth one of the Office of Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships' four key priorities. The Schott Foundation study concluded the following; In Texas, the data from the 2009-2010 cohort of students reports that the high school graduation rate for all students is 86%, African American students is 81%, however the rate for African American males who graduate high school in 4 years is 53%. One could surmise from the findings that there is a direct correlation between education (lack of) and employment, income and incarceration-with black males leading the way in all categories.





It was these findings that led to the Basileus of Psi Alpha Chapter (Billy Fair) stating; "the data suggested that something had to be done and we can start at the local level by bringing in our young boys and their fathers (and father figures) to begin the conversation of intervention." To help address these critical needs, Bro. Fair formed a committee to convene a Youth Leadership Conference and Fatherhood Initiative. Held on the beautiful campus of St. Philips College in San Antonio, TX. The call was made to young boys and their fathers throughout the city and hundreds responded. The day was filled with guest speakers and breakout sessions. The boys were instructed on proper study habits, proper grooming habits and how to navigate through school and life. The fathers/father figures participated in their own roundtable discussion with leaders of various religious and community organizations revealing that they themselves grew up without a father, but someone intervened in their life and they are now able to tell their stories. The day was capped by a keynote address from Min. Nuri Muhammad, who made a passionate plea for the young boys to "stay the course," when it comes to their education and life. Min. Muhammad eloquently painted the picture of his own life and how sports and academics assisted him to reach his goals in life- but insisted that it was education that made the true difference in his upbringing.







The local undergraduate chapter (Alpha Delta Lambda) ADL, chartered on the campus of the University of Texas San Antonio (UTSA), also provided uplift to the young participants. When speaking to the young men of ADL, it was noted that of the original men who chartered the chapter only a few years ago (March, 2008), their graduation rate is nearly 100%. The undergraduate advisor (Bro. Jamal Hasty) mentioned that the rate would be 100%, but two members entered military service before graduation. In the years to come, Psi Alpha Chapter will continue to mentor and host the city's young boys with activities and provide more leadership and training as these soon to be young men enter adulthood and begin their lives as responsible husbands, fathers and leaders.



Clark, a junior at Wiley College, came to Marshall from Dallas. Calling himself a "nerd," Clark said the idea for the drive came from a leadership training that he and others in the fraternity attended. Chapter Vice President Joel Wiggins, 21, a senior at Wiley College, came to Marshall from New Jersey.

Both Wiggins and Clark are excited about the opportunity to help college men like themselves better themselves. "We want to give male students the opportunity to have things that they may not have ... to help them dress for success," Clark said. "Our chapter is about community service. We have fundraisers, and we even go every week to New Bethel Baptist Church and tutor kids. We have had a drunk driving seminar, and we are doing a blood drive Feb. 3 in Alumni Gymnasium from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m," Wiggins said. "For us, having the suit drive is another way to give back ... we're giving our fellow male students an outlet to represent themselves appropriately in a way that they may not have not known before," Clark said.

For Clark, having the suit drive will help the fraternity to help others like themselves project a better image. "It is time that we step up and change, and lead by example," he said. "First impressions are everything," Clark said. The suit drive is not associated with Wiley College, Wiggins said. "It is all Omegas," he said.





On a day where most are partaking in celebrations of sort, Psi Alpha Chapter continues to live up to their dedication of duty by honoring some of America's heroes'. The tradition of Psi Alpha rendering of flag honors began around the 2004 timeframe when the late Brother James "6-Fo" Blair, a member of the Psi Alpha Chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., along with the Boy Scout Troop of which he served as Den Father, partnered together and organized the first laying of flags on the gravesite of the cities fallen.

The San Antonio National Cemetery, located on the East-side of San Antonio (517 Paso Hondo Street, San Antonio, Texas) was discovered as another opportunity to provide some basic labor and contribute to uplifting the community by Brother Blair, the Troop and the Brothers of Psi Alpha Chapter. Under the guidance of Blair (also a member of Second Baptist Church) the Brothers of Psi Alpha Chapter and his Troop would continue to participate in the honor of laying and retrieving the flags until 2007, when the Troop disbanded due to unforeseen changes amongst the young Troop and its membership.

It was then that Psi Alpha Chapter adopted this as a sole

tradition, to be carried out every year around Memorial Day. Around the same time, a local San Antonio news station (KSAT News) heard of the selfless acts being performed by the chapter and decided that this newsworthy event should receive public notification, which would bring the National Cemetery the recognition it deserved.

Today the cemetery stands as a U.S. National Register of Historic Places and is groomed to perfection year round. The Brothers of Psi Alpha Chapter continues with the legacy of notably recognizing the heroes buried in this National Cemetery and pledge to continue to uplift the community through their untiring efforts.

Notable interments

Private David B. Barkley, (Medal of Honor recipient for action in World War I); Second Lieutenant George E. M. Kelly, (namesake of Kelly Air Force Base); Corporal Harry M. Wurzbach (Spanish-American War, as US Congressman served 1921 until his death 1931); Private William H. Barnes, (Medal of Honor recipient for action at the Battle of Chaffin's Farm in the Civil War); Private George W. Smith, (Medal of Honor recipient for action in the Indian Wars); Corporal John J. Given, (Medal of Honor recipient for action in the Indian Wars); Four Medal of Honor recipients are buried in the cemetery as unknowns.

His experiments on preserving blood plasma allowed medics to save thousands of lives of the Allied forces. As the most preeminent African-American in the field, Drew protested against the practice of racial segregation in the donation of

ity health improvement. This very important action helps local hospitals and medical centers in Houston transform the future of health care. With every drive, we help to turn science into practical benefit and turn hope into reality. The chapter accomplishes this through support for exquisite care, innovative research and vital education focused on eliminating blood shortages and increasing the success of major operations. The chapter supports this great cause by establishing blood drive donation days and also provides referrals of potential donors to the Blood Center Representative. The donors that the chapter recruits to our







blood, as it lacked scientific foundation, an action which ultimately cost him his job. Bro. Drew's distinction in his profession was finally recognized later in life and his work became the foundation for the operation the American Red Cross Blood Bank (which he help establish) and all of the blood banks operating today.

The need for blood continues today as it did during Bro. Drew's era. Cancer patients, accident victims and others with bleeding disorders need red blood cells and platelets today more the ever. Frequent blood donations make saving lives possible. Accordingly, Theta Chi has established a partnership with Gulf Coast Regional Blood Center to make a difference in people's lives. This effort brings together courageous and inspired individuals to donate blood and produce a safe and ample blood supply, while advancing cutting-edge research and embracing continuous qual-




