Many schools across the Mid-South moved to virtual learning last year amid the ongoing coronavirus pandemic. Bottled water and hand sanitizer have become much-needed essentials for schools where in-person learning is happening. Four black Greek-letter organizations helped students and staff at one school stay safe from the spread of the virus. Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority delivered nearly 5,000 bottles of water and 2,000 bottles of hand sanitizer to Maddux Elementary. The school is facing what teacher one educator called a "year of adjustments. "We have definitely been faced with challenges as far as our rotation schedule with classes," Principal Kalisha Pitts said. Pitts said challenges include stretching the supplies of water and hand sanitizer the school received from the District. "This was tremendous and extremely important," Pitts said. "Our students aren't able to use the water fountain like they normally would." Brian Didlake, of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, said the organizations wanted to give the kids water to drink throughout the day because hydration is critical. Financial gifts used to purchase supplies also came from Alpha Kappa Alpha and Delta Sigma Theta sororities.



Dr. Charles R. Drew Blood Drive

On Monday, Jan. 17, 2022, Psi Alpha Chapter, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., in partnership with the South Texas Mobile Blood Center, held our Annual Charles R. Drew Blood Drive during the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (MLK) Health Fair. Dr. Charles Drew was a blood plasma scientist. Dr. Drew discovered that plasma, or the liquid portion of the blood is separated from the blood cells and is frozen, it can be stored for much longer than untreated blood, which can only be kept for a week. The longer blood can be stored, the more likely it is that it can be used in a transfusion, or process by which stored blood (from a blood donor) is given to someone who is injured and has lost a great deal of his or her own blood. Dr. Drew's discovery contributed to the establishment of blood banks. He set up and ran a blood bank in a hospital in New York City that served as a model for the system of blood banks still in use today by the American Red Cross. Dr. Drew was the first medical director of the American Red Cross; and, while in this position, he came up with the idea of the "Bloodmobile," the bus that travels from blood banks to companies and schools to collect blood. Bloodmobiles can now be seen everywhere collecting blood to be used in emergency situations. The blood drive was a successful event as thirty-four (34) donors were able to help save lives. We would like to thank all those who donated as well as those who registered to donate but could not.

New Health & Wellness Building to be Named in Honor of William Allen Hudgins Provided By St. Philip's College / Psi Alpha / San Antonio, TX.



The Alamo Colleges District Board voted on Wednesday, October 27, 2021, to name the new St. Philip's College Health & Wellness Building in honor of William Allen Hudgins who contributed nearly 40 years of service to St. Philip's College and his community. Hudgins was the first basketball coach at St. Philip's College where he served as a role model to young men for 18 years. As a coach, he encouraged high academic standards while overseeing the mental health, growth, and development of team members. He was committed to strengthening the development of children of color in the community.

Hudgins (affectionately known as "Coach" and "Meatboy") is prominently displayed as a part of the St. Philip's College Historical Legacy Wall located in the Bowden Center on the Third Floor of the Sutton Learning Center. Hudgins was the fifth child of five children born to John and Artie Hudgins in Mathews County, Virginia on May 9, 1917. At age six his mother moved to Phoebus, Virginia where he attended the Whittier School. After finishing the Whittier School, he went to George P. Phenix High School where he excelled in academics and athletics. When he finished high school, he was offered an athletic scholarship to Virginia State University but opted to take a work-study scholarship at Hampton Institute in 1935. It was at Hampton Institute that he became a legendary "Hampton Pirate" playing for the great coaches during that time, Gideon "Gid" Smith, Charles H. Williams (founder of the CIAA), and Herman "Buck" Neilson. Hudgins was considered one of the premier athletes earning the title "3-LETTER MAN" for his athletic success in football, basketball, and track. When he finished Hampton Institute in 1940, he earned a Master's Degree from the University of Pennsylvania and was also the basketball coach at Cambridge High School in Baltimore, Maryland. In 1942, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps as a Tuskegee Airman but was too tall to fit in the fighter planes during that time. He then became a Tuskegee Airman trainer and applied to Officer's Candidate School (OCS), was accepted, and came to San Antonio, Texas to attend. Hudgins coached track and field and was an assistant football coach at Bishop College from 1948 to 1949. In 1949, he was offered a job as the first basketball coach at St. Philip's College where he served as the only basketball coach for 18 years. He also served as Dean of Student Affairs for 19 years. He retired from St. Philip's in 1982.He lived a long, full, meaningful life and served as a mentor to many African American young adults. One of his major accomplishments was that he taught about 3,000 African American children how to swim during vacations before segregation ended. He was a long-time member of Second Baptist Church, a life member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), a founding member of the Courtiers, a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., and a member of the Hampton University Alumni Association. In January 2011, he was inducted into the Hampton University Athletic Hall of Fame. Hudgins passed away on June 13, 2011, peaceably watching television in his favorite chair. He was preceded in death by his parents, John and Artie, sister Lena, brothers Morris, John, and Lindsay, and his beloved wife of 58 years, Vernis. He is survived by his daughter Patricia, son William Allen Jr. (Billy), grandchildren William Allen III (B), Channon Teria, Jenifer Patrice, Sarah Hollie, great-granddaughter Morgan Simone and a host of other relatives and friends. The new William Allen Hudgins Health and Wellness (WAH) Building will replace the existing college fitness center built in 1949. The 57,000-square-foot two-story gymnasium and natatorium will include an elevated track, short course swimming pool, therapy pool, weight, cardio training spaces, aerobic studio, cardio studio, teaching labs for kinesiology, first aid/ CPR, massage therapy, gathering spaces, and staff offices. The building will be completed in 2022.






Chaplain's Corner

Subject: Testimony of a Tattoo

Isaiah 49: 14-17



Listen to the words of the gospel prophet, Isaiah, chapter 49, verses 13-17:

Sing, O heavens; and be joyful, O earth; and break forth into singing, O mountains: for the Lord hath comforted his people, and will have mercy upon his afflicted. But Zion said, The Lord hath forsaken me, and my Lord hath forgotten me. Can a woman forget her sucking child, that she should not have compassion on the son of her womb? yea, they may forget, yet will I not forget thee. Behold, I have graven thee upon the palms of my hands; thy walls are continually before me. Thy children shall make haste; thy destroyers and they that made thee waste shall go forth of thee.

Notice verse 16 of Isaiah 49:

Behold, I have graven thee upon the palms of my hands; thy walls are continually before me.

Now that phrase graven thee upon the palms of my hands, pictures an engraved object, perhaps a tattoo on the hands of the mother. Isaiah uses this image of a tattoo in the hands of the mother of an Assyrian soldier who had left home to go into battle. Every time the mother saw her sons's name in her hand, she remembered he was in harm's way perhaps on foreign soul. Since it was also believed there was a link between the hand and heart she constantly thought of him and what he may be enduring in the heat of battle. And like any mother she desired his safe return. And this next phrase in verse 16, of Isaiah 49, thy walls are continually before me says that though Jerusalem and its walls had been destroyed, God looked at the present situation in terms of what the future held for them, restored walls, not the present condition.

This image, testimony of the tattoo says that God will never forget not forsaken his children just as a mother would never forsake nor cease to love her child whether dead or alive. In a world of so much fear and anger this Assyrian mother's tattoo testifies several truths.

First, God's mind is constantly on us: Just as that mother looked at her hand or hands and her son's name and thought of him immediately and consistently, his mind, his thoughts are on us. We not feel this is true. But remember feelings can be deceptive. How many of us have felt one way about a matter but later discovered our attitudes were dead wrong and totally unfounded. Remember this truth as told in the Bible in Jeremiah 29, verse 11 and Romans 8, verses 37–39:For I know the plans that I [a]have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans for welfare and not for calamity to give you a future and a hope.

But in all these things we overwhelmingly conquer through Him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other created thing, will be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord. Second, we are not only on God's mind but he identifies with our hurts. In order to get a tattoo engraved anywhere on the body one must endure a little pain, and I am told some swelling. Imagine the Assyrian mother's discomfort had having her son's name engraved on her hand. Many people believe God is detached from our pain. But nothing could be farther from the truth. In Exodus, chapter 3 verse 7, when God speaks to Moses at the burning bush we hear him say these words of identification:

The Lord said, "I have surely seen the affliction of My people who are in Egypt, and have given heed to their cry because of their taskmasters, for I am aware of their sufferings. In other translations the words I am aware are rendered I know, or I have intimate knowledge or feel what they feel. The fact that God feels our hurts underscores the fact he wants his children to approach him boldly, fearlessly. All of us perhaps as little children have suffered injuries of a sort.

And the first thing we did was to cry, and then go an adult if not a parent for treatment. That parent might be busy with other things but they would drop what they were doing to give us attention. They did not fuss but either went to the first aid kit, medicine cabinet in the bathroom or they took us to the doctor. The psalmist pictures this loving concern to us by our God when we read in Psalm 3,verse 3: But You, O Lord, are a shield about me, My glory, and the One who lifts my head. Another translation renders that verse, But thou O Lord art a shield for me, my glory, and the lifter of my head.

Look at that imagery of the psalmist: Shield to protect us from the onslaught of enemies as we read in Psalm 3, verse 1 he is outnumbered by foes, yet he looks to God for protection, for the Lord knows the damage that can be done; my glory, my focus alone, or my weight my strength as you show yourself as Redeemer; and the Lifter of my head pictures a subject of a country going into the throne room of a Ruler, and when entering his presence, he falls flat on his face or bows the knee to give him respect or homage. What does the Ruler do? Tell the subject to rise and state his case? No, the King gets up off of his throne, steps down and walks to the bowed subject, and lifts up his head to hear his pleas. The ruler did not care how he was dressed or what the problem was. That is what God does for us in His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ for read in the letter to the Hebrews, chapter 4, verses 14–16:

Seeing then that we have a great high priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our profession. For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need. Third, we are not only on God's mind, not only does he identifies with our hurts, but we are not just on his hands we are IN his hands. The Assyrian mother put the tattoo on her hand to remind her of him and as expression of love for her son. In ancient Semitic thought it was the believed that the hand and heart were linked as wedding ring on the hands of the man and woman, links their hearts together in a bond of love. However, just having his name on her limited her to just wondering how he is doing, would he survive battlefield injuries or sickness. Despite her love and concern, distance prevented her from being there with him. But when we look at the tattoo we can go a step further and praise God that he thinks about us always, but then we not only engraved on his hands but WE ARE IN HANDS. And the good news is than anything that is the hands is under the control of the one to whom the hand belongs. Human hands very in capacity to hold yes control some things: They may weak, crippled; sometimes disinterested because they don't have a tight grip on the object, hence men and women often drop what ought to be precious and treated as priceless. As our country battles this deadly virus, it is obviously that someone dropped the ball not did they care to catch it; some one's hands just were not on the steering wheel; no they never behind the wheel.

But we are in God's hands and his is a loving but firm grip on us and on the situation that no power can knock us out his hands. He may move slow but he has a grip; and if he moves fast he will tighten the grip so as not to drop us. We read of his grip on us in John 6, verse 37 and Jude 24 respectively: All those the Father gives me will come to me, and whoever comes to me I will never drive away (or cast out). To him who is able to keep you from stumbling (or falling) and to present you before his glorious presence without fault and with great joy: Jude pictures here a man on a horse but he has a guide to hold the reins insuring the horse does not stumble and the passenger on the beast falls and has a terrible accident despite the terrain. God remember has never promised a trouble free trip, but he guarantees a safe arrival or safe landing.

Fourth, we are not only on God's mind, not only does he identifies with our hurts, and we are not just on his hands we are IN his hands but the tattoo reminds of an identification, a link between mother and son, or between members of an organization. Earlier I stated that men even women get tattoos to remind them of their connection with some one dear and/or organization. Members of Greek organization will get tattooed or branded to show their love for the brotherhood or sisterhood. Well, when I behold by faith the one who was stretched wide and hung high and see the wounds in his hands and feet and the spear wound on his side, that tells me he identifies with us as our elder brother, that he picks up our pain, bears our burdens, liberates us by his lacerations, injured for our iniquities, tortured for our transgressions, reviled for our righteousness, wounded for our wrongs, died our death as we hear Isaiah say in chapter 53, verses 4-7:

Surely he took up our pain and bore our suffering, yet we considered him punished by God, stricken by him, and afflicted. But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed. We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to our own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth.

And for those who received him by faith and acceptance his sacrifice for our sins, when we behold those wounds, those "tattoos" on his body, he engraves, yes tattoos his name on our hearts that can never be removed. So beloved we face this crisis, again, we remember the tattoo on the hands of that Assyrian mother remembers us of another set of hands Hands we cannot see, but every now and then we feel the touch of his hands of which the older generation said, that "It runs like lightning and it burns like fire." We see the results of the movement of those hands orchestrated the movements of the universe guiding and controlling the procession of history. Those hands the fingerprints of which we cannot see except by the forensics of faith and sense the presence via his grace.

How to submit an article for The Oracle & Source Newsletters

- 1. When writing the story use merriweather font and 11pt size. The first line of your story should be the title in regular print no caps or bold letters, for example Brothers Uplift the Community. The Second line should be the brother who wrote it, chapter name, and city the chapter is in for example, Bro. Frank Watson / Rho Xi / Freeport, TX. The suggested length for the body of your story is between 150–300 words. Do not put pictures or graphics within the story, it should only contain words, punctuation, and characters in the format explained above. Do not combine multiple stories within one word document. See the articles within The Source as a reference for the writing format required for submissions.
- 2. Draft an email. Your email should contain word document and picture attachments. Each word document and picture must be labeled with state, chapter, and event name for example (TX-Theta Alpha- Voter Registration) so that they can be properly saved within the database.
- 3. Send your email to flwatson31@gmail.com.
- 4. You will receive a reply within 24 hours stating "Received, Thank You". If you do not receive a reply double check to ensure your email was received.
- 5. Please only submit noteworthy articles from your chapter on a monthly basis.

#### How to submit a video for The Source TV Videocast

- 1. Record content by cell phone or tablet with the I Movie (Apple) or FilmoraGo (Android) application. Filming the video within these applications will give you edit capabilities that are compatible with what the PR Committee uses. Also, while recording content be sure your device is facing sideways because the final video will be widescreen.
- 2. Edit your video clips to create one 30 second to 2 minutes long video. Name the video file with state, chapter, and event name. (AR Phi Mu Mu Adopt-A-Highway)
- 3. Upload your video file to a google drive or i cloud folder to provide download capability.
- 4. Share the video file with flwatson31@gmail.com so that it can be downloaded, reviewed, and added to The Source TV google drive folder. I you upload to a google drive you can send it to be shared as a google file video via email.


