On October 1, 2022, the Brothers of Epsilon Alpha Chapter, Ninth District of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. celebrated 90 years of service to the city of Fort Worth, TX.

Epsilon Alpha Chapter was chartered October 1, 1932, under the direction of Brother William C. Paul, 5th Ninth District Representative (1931–1933). It is the oldest chapter in the Dallas-Fort Worth (DFW) Metroplex.

To commemorate the milestone celebration, Epsilon Alpha hosted a series of events including a cigar lounge fellowship, golf tournament, volunteering at Tarrant County Food Bank, a community cookout, and attending worship service at a local church. The highlight event occurring the evening before the 90th was the scholarship fundraising banquet featuring several distinguished guests and special moments.

In theme with Epsilon Alpha's moniker, "the Cornerstone Ques", Ninth District Representative Bro. Harold Bailey spoke on the significance and symbolism behind the cornerstone when used during the process of construction as it is the first stone set in a structure. Before it is placed, it is carefully evaluated both on its own and in relation to what is to come around it, ensuring proper alignment and stability when the building is complete. Bro. Bailey likened the metaphor to Epsilon Alpha being the foundational start of Omega's presence within DFW that provided the opportunity for growth in surrounding areas to occur in the form of other chapters.

The keynote address was provided by Grand Counselor Bro. Clement Osimetha, who gave a passionate and moving speech reflecting on how far Fort Worth has evolved in 90 years. He challenged the audience to consider the past; recognizing the efforts of those brothers who established the charter in an era of the city that was deeply segregated and hostile toward African-Americans, and how we, benefit today from their bravery and collective leadership.

In attendance was Loraine Lee, widow of 38th Grand Basileus Bro. Dr. Warren G. Lee Jr. She was presented with the chapter's resolution following her husband's entrance into Omega Chapter on July 18, 2022. A special tribute and standing ovation was given to Bro. "Judge" L. Clifford Davis. Initiated through Tau Chapter in Spring 1947, Bro. Davis celebrated his 75th anniversary in the fraternity this year and is an active and financial brother in Epsilon Alpha at the age of 98. Bro. Davis was one of the first two Black lawyers in Fort Worth; two notable lawsuits he filed were the cases that ultimately led to the desegregation of both Fort Worth and Mansfield school districts. He also assisted Thurgood Marshall in the landmark case Brown v. Board of Education. As Epsilon Alpha looks to the future of serving its community and surrounding areas, the chapter does so with the desire of being a positive influence to all and showcasing service and leadership lead by our four Cardinal Principles: Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance, and Uplift.




Brothers Meet Community Need with Charles R. Drew Blood Drive By Bro. Steven Singleton, Sr.

The festivities started on October 25th when the Chapter had two Proclamations presented by Bexar County Commissioner Judge Nelson Wolff, one Proclamation was for Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Incorporated celebrating 111 years as an organization, and the second Proclamation was for Psi Alpha Chapter celebrating 82 years as a Chapter. He read the proclamation about Psi Alpha and then spoke about how Charter Brother, Valmo Bellinger assisted with his first win in politics. He spoke proudly of his relationships with the Bellinger family. Judge Wolff is one of two men to have the distinction of being the Mayor of San Antonio and the Bexar County Commissioner.

On October 26 we had the pleasure of being recognized by Communities in Schools for being the top Group doner for Stuff the Bus. We were the only organization that was not a corporation in the top 10 in donations. Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Incorporated, Psi Alpha Chapter - "The Alamo City Ques" have been assisting Communities in Schools of San Antonio annual Stuff the Bus School Supply Drive for over 15 years providing free school supplies to thousands of underserved students and families throughout the school year. This is a great effort we see firsthand as we mentor throughout the city and every little bit helps! Our organization raised \$6800.00 among less than half of our 220 members which is very special. What does \$6,800.00 mean to a school district? Rogers Middle School hosted the event and showed us where the donations are utilized. The school administration and Community in Schools site coordinator explained that the supplies and cash that each coordinator receives enables a student to have all the tools needed to succeed. Many of our member assumed it was just a backpack and a few pens but seeing the computers, earbuds, deodorant, and other items each student received educated us a great deal. We are one of the longest tenured organizations with Communities in Schools and hearing from teachers and administration who state that giving through Communities in Schools assists them better than us giving to them through the schools as a discretionary donation was great to hear.

On October 29th the Chapter headed to the Westside of the city to assist at the San Antonio Food Bank. The San Antonio Food Bank takes pride in fighting hunger, feeding hope in the 29-county service area. They believe that no child should go to bed hungry, adults should not have to choose between a hot meal and utilities, nor a senior sacrifice medical care for the sake of a meal. Founded in 1980, The San Antonio Food Bank has quickly grown to serve 100,000 individuals a week in one of the largest service areas in Texas. Their focus is for clients to have food for today but to also have the resources to be self-sufficient in the future.

Fighting hunger is their number one priority but they also serve to educate and aid in many other ways. They achieve this through our variety of programs and resources available to families, individuals, seniors, children, and military members in need. Today's work by Psi Alpha assisted thousands having items they would not have had without the South Texas Food Bank and volunteers such as ourselves.

On October 30th Brothers Jamal Hasty and Kevin Grant hosted us at their church for Sunday service. Life Point Church under the leadership of Pastor Danny Rivers hosted the Chapter to a beautiful service and the sermon "If Money Talked" resonated with all of us. Following service, we ate brunch with our families and it was a beautiful time spent by all in attendance.

On October 31st we set aside time to visit the graves of 6 of the 8 Charter members laid to rest in the Alamo City. The Chapter ensures all graves in the city have been adorned with flowers. All locations are shared with the Chapter members to visit, and times are set aside at each cemetery. Two Charter members, Brother Dr. William V. Hurd DDS and Brother Valmo Charles Bellinger are buried at Eastview Cemetery. Two Charter members, Brother Dr. Madison L. Preacher, and Brother Ernest M. Foxx are both interned at Sunset Memorial Park in the same area of mausoleums. The reaming 2 Charter members, Brother George P. Inge Jr., and Brother Joseph P. Chretien Jr. are buried at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery.

This is a great tradition I hope the Chapter continues. It is important to know whence you came. The poet James Arthur Baldwin stated: "Know from whence you came. If you know whence you came, there are absolutely no limitations to where you can go". As November 1 creeps closer I hoped the reflection had begun within our minds and souls. We must look back and reflect on our proud pasts. We have 6 of our 8 Charter Brothers buried in San Antonio and the other 2 out of state and October 31st is set aside to honor their memories.

Later that evening the brothers not participating with Halloween met to watch Monday Night Football. Four9 Cigars is an Omega Brother owned business, they regularly arrange various events, meetings, and special private events such as cigar samplings, pre-event parties, and other Member only events. Members are also able to rent out the lounge for special and private events. The classy venue was just the place needed to unwind after a hard day.

November 1, 2022, marked 82 years of service to the Alamo City by Psi Alpha Chapter. Over 100 Brothers met at the Psi Alpha Chapter Fraternity House to celebrate this momentous occasion. The fellowship was genuine and after being locked up since COVID-19 shut down events like this it was great to see and be seen by so many of your friends. From our humble beginnings we are now a Chapter of close to 200 financial members. San Antonio is a Chapter influenced by the large active duty and retired military who reside in our city.

These 8 Great Men who chartered our Chapter, they did not find or found anything. So many articles call them our "Founders", but Omega Psi Phi only has 4 Founders and countless others who have Chartered Chapters, but they did not find anything. In 1940, eight professional men from varied careers ranging from 4 educators, a dentist, a civil servant, a physician, and a businessman who had become members of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated during their college years, decided that the time was right to form a Graduate Chapter here in the City of San Antonio. They were as young as 24 years of age to as old as 49 years of age. They all had attended historically Black Colleges and University's (HBCU's) due to segregation in the United States at this time in history. Some were raised in San Antonio, some from other cities in the state of Texas, one from Georgia, and one from Virginia. Two were Veterans of WWI and one went on to serve in WW II after the Chapter was chartered. After compiling all the necessary information, paperwork and complying with the National Body's Guidelines, the Local Chapter was chartered by the Supreme Council of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated on November 1, 1940, and given the name of Psi Alpha. "Long Live the Alamo City Ques!"

"The Bellinger Legacy"

Although many drive down the street in San Antonio named after the Bellinger's their legacy is being forgotten. There are many dynasties in American culture. San Antonio had a family that were millionaires in the early 1900s. 35 years after slavery a black family was on their way to being one of the richest families in the Alamo City regardless. Whenever you're riding on New Braunfels on the Eastside of San Antonio look at Greater Corinth Baptist Church, this huge gated building and all its land was the residence of the Bellinger family.

Charles Valmo Bellinger Sr.– The patriarch from Lockhart, Texas was the unofficial "Black Mayor" of San Antonio who came here on his way to Nevada to gamble and decided to stay after winning so much money and opened a great deal of businesses. Let's bring this into perspective: it is 1906, and this young black man at the age of 21 (born and raised in the South shortly after slavery ended) is a business owner. He expanded his activities to include: a pool hall, a cafe, a cab company, a Real Estate and Construction Company, a theater, a barbershop, a private lending service for Blacks, a lottery, and a bootlegging operation that operated during Prohibition. Bellinger Sr. was known more as a political party boss than any of his legal and illegal businesses.

Charles Valmo Bellinger Jr.- Valmo took over all his father's businesses in 1932 and was a Political Party Boss until 1972. He went to Harvard after prep school in Minnesota then graduated from Lincoln and started law school at Penn but left early to take over the family business. Although he continued his family's legacy in politics he is known for the San Antonio Register. Founded by Valmo, the paper began printing in 1931, running without interruption for 47 years. Though its initial goal was preserving the political influence of Bellinger's father, the paper later focused on local, state, and national news of specific concern to San Antonio's African-American community. The archive consisted of 22,000 issues and offered an almost complete run of issues from 1945 to 1978. If you ever have a chance to look over these archives, the Black History of South Texas is remarkable.

Harry Middleton Bellinger – 19 years younger than Valmo, Harry went to Wheatley High School graduating at 16, and then went to Wiley College graduating in 3 years, graduating at 19. After Wiley he followed his brother's path to the prestigious University of Pennsylvania and entered the Wharton School of Business, he could not attend Graduate school in Texas because blacks could not attend the major White Colleges in Texas at this time in history. Harry attended Wharton from 1939–1941and received his MBA and tested for and passed his CPA. Harry was the first black graduate with an MBA from Wharton. It was a huge accomplishment that a young man 22 years of age from the segregated South who attended an all-black high school, an all-black college, and was shunned by white schools in Texas would accomplish what he did at a premier lvy League school. After these accomplishments, he could have easily gone into the Accounting and Business field but decided to attend the same law school his brother had attended at the University of Pennsylvania.

In 1945 he became the first black to graduate the law school at Penn and passed the Texas State Bar immediately after graduation. At the age of 26, he had his Law degree, MBA, CPA, and was certified by the Texas Bar. From 1945 until 1991 he practiced law at his own practice in San Antonio, Texas. During the late 40s throughout the 1950s, Harry was active in Civil Rights cases and was the legal counsel for the San Antonio Chapter of the NAACP. While serving in this role Harry was the lead attorney in the Wendell Sweatt case which involved the legality of Blacks not being admitted to state-funded universities. His brother Valmo supported the creation of Texas Southern University, but also aided the Sweatt case that desegregated Texas public colleges and universities. Texas Southern as we know it today was created when Sweatt sued the University of Texas law school. The state had no law school for African Americans, and in an attempt to not integrate the University of Texas Law School, the state established the Texas State University of Negroes which would include a law school. As a result, the Fiftieth Texas Legislature passed Texas Senate Bill 140 on March 3, 1947, authorizing and funding the creation of Texas State University for Negroes as the first state-funded black university.

The case Sweatt vs Painter (Theophilus Painter was the president of the University of Texas) went all the way to the Supreme Court where Thurgood Marshall argued and won the case and this case set up Brown vs the Board of Education. The Supreme Court ruled that schools could not be separate and yet equal and that state-funded educational institutions could not exclude Blacks. On June 1, 1951, the name of this new university for Negroes was changed from Texas State University for Negroes to Texas Southern University after students petitioned the state legislature to remove the phrase "for Negroes".

After reading this article and being shocked you have been in San Antonio all these years and knew nothing of this family, please pass the information to our youth to ensure that this history is not forgotten.

New Health & Wellness Building to be Named in Honor of Brother Coach William **Allen Hudgins** Written By: Scott L. Earle, Sr.

I always say Reading is Fundamental (RIF) but when you can witness history that supports something you have read your educational experience is enhanced. On October 27, 2021, it was announced that the new Health and Wellness building on the Campus of St. Phillips College was going to be named in honor of William Allen Hudgins. I began to read all I could read about this man who earned this great honor. Attending the grand opening on August 18, 2022, was a thrill.

From 1949 until 1982 Coach Hudgins worked at St Phillip's College. In 1949, he was offered a job as the first basketball coach at St. Philip's College where he served as the only basketball coach for 18 years. He also served as Dean of Student Affairs for 19 years. He retired from St. Philip's in 1982. Today I had the opportunity to meet individuals who he taught to swim during segregation. His family commented that one of his greatest accomplishments was that he taught about 3,000 African American children how to swim during his vacations before segregation ended. When there were not many places that Blacks could swim or have certified swimming instructors who would teach Black children, Coach Hudgins filled that void.

The College and High School students who share the campus and will utilize this facility will now ensure Coach Hudgins's life is always remembered. The new William Allen Hudgins Health and Wellness (WAH) Building will replace the existing college fitness center built in 1949. The 57,000-square-foot two-story gymnasium and natatorium will include an elevated track, short course swimming pool, therapy pool, weight, cardio training spaces, aerobic studio, cardio studio, teaching labs for kinesiology, first aid/ CPR, massage therapy, gathering spaces, and staff offices.

Having the opportunity to attend the ceremonies with members of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated, Psi Alpha Chapter which is an organization that Brother Coach Hudgins joined in 1957 was a great honor to be able to share with my brothers in the great legacy of Brother Coach!

From the turbulence we see on television, and hear on radio, the world is topsy turvy. And such a sad state of affarirs, causes our world to get upside down. Our world being turned upside down, not only seen in the terrible news of mass shootings, the force who seek to undermine our democracy, as well as the present state of our economy with shortages of baby formula, high price of gasoline, yes, inflation. Even we personally experience our world being upside down in terms of lay off notices, sickeness, family problems, etc. How then do we face such realities as our world being turned upside down? For answer we put need to look in the book of the Psalms. The Book of Psalms is the hymnbook of the Bible and therefore actually the hymn book of the church. Proverbs, often seen as a twin to the Psalms is to be read on the feet, as its practical advice. But Psalms is to be read on the knees, as it is a book of worship. And the Psalms covers every emotion conceivable-fear, anger, joy, but also loneliness and depression. And it is this book that we find the answer on how to handle such a situation in Psalm 42, verse 11 which is as follows:

Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise him, my Savior and my God.

Or heard in the New Living Translation

Why am I discouraged? Why is my heart so sad? I will put my hope in God! I will praise him again— my Savior and my God!

The psalm begins with psalmist describing his thirst for the living God during trouble or even exile he has a deep uneasiness as heard in the text, that his soul is cast down. The image of being cast down in the Hebrew, descibes a sheep on his back with its legs dangling in the air. And when it is on is back with its legs dangling in the air, if not back on his feet, it die either by being eaten by wild animals or gases can build up in its body, causing it to have a heart attack and die.

As we look at our world, we too feel cast down, loneliness, depressed that is not good for a spiritual, mental and even physical will being. What then does for us to be like upside sheep?

First, when one views the world upside down, his vision is distorted as he does not see things as they really are, the way God's see them. Again in Psalm 42, verse 11: Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise him, my Savior and my God. In left in that condition, our hope would go on holiday; life instead of being a festival, would the solemness of a funeral. We would find ourselves focusing solely on valuables, treating one should held as treasure like it is trash, and trash like treasure. We see this all over the landscape: wrong is right; right is wrong. People would rather die for a lie rather live in and by the truth; education instead of being loved is loath, as good students are often put down, and called "nerds" yet their critics forget that nerds sign a whole a lot of paychecks.

When one's world is turned upside down, it will even distort his faith, causing him to see the problem he faces bigger than the God who can solve them. His faith rather than be one of maturity and grow in the likeness of our Christ, is a mere reflection of the fads of the culture: Sometimes the church fails to produce mature saints, rather we are a producing spiritual adolescents. If one desires to see the mind set of the church, look at teenagers: Teenagers pick up and put down fads at will; Teenagers, don't get the total picture as they will only see only one portion of it, rather than the whole view; Teenagers speak of rights, but don't want to hear responsibilities, as they will speak of using the car but will not take out the trash; and teenagers have misplaced priorities: If not put in check they will listen to music or play video games, rather than do they homeworkL and many in the church desire entertainment rather enlightenment, noise, rather knowledge, sugary candy cotton and pop psychology preaching and teaching rather than spiritual and mental nourishment of sound doctrine.

Second, sheep end up on their backs for a number of reasons. Hear again the words of the text, Psalm 42, verse 11: Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise him, my Savior and my God. We as his sheep can get in an upside down or "cast" down position for a few reasons:

One, the season of the year that sheep get in this condition is spring during the lambing season, when lambs are born. Sometimes the weight of that upborn lamb can cause it to loose its balance. Often when we are of verge of new achievements we can loose our balance, finally about to fulfill our dreams, hopes, aspirations, one slip, one mistake or misjudgment can instantly cause us land on a our backs. That is why many of our youth who lives are pregnant with promise mistakenly believe that some things cannot happen them. One wrong move, one bad decision, can change things forever. And slipups like that some times occur when youth feel it cannot happen to them, act wrongly because of loyalty to friends or peers.

Just as in the natural one must always do what we see on signs near steps or uneven surfaces: WATCH YOUR STEP. Or remember another sign we often see in either construction zones or a bad weather: PROCEED WITH CAUTION. Keep in mind these words from Proverbs, chapter 12, verse 14: There is a way that appears to be right, but in the end it leads to death.

Two, excess weight caused by too much wool can cause the sheep to stumble on and land on its back. Life is liken to a journey. And like any trip we carry a lot of excess baggage that than weight or slow us down from reaching the destiny God has chosen for us. I remember when I worked in the school system at a middle school. Some students from grades 6, 7, and 8 would carry their bookbags all day from their arrival for class through lunch period till dismissal. I would encourage them to lay down the bags, and relax. But also it was a strain on their backs at such a young age. We can in this life carry burdens that the Lord desires to give to back to avoid such a situation. Many of us carrying knapsacks that we have been burden down with for years: Old grudges, old hurts, old failures, old disappointments. Yet we carry a heavy load within that can cause us to stumble and fall as we have let go and let God. The apostle Peter writes in his letter at large, chapter 5, verses 6-7: Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time: Casting all your care upon him; for he careth for you. The term casting all your cares upon pictures a traveler dropping a load off of his back. And sentiment is heard in a line from this song: Take your burden to the Lord and leave it there.

Three, sometimes sheep land on their backs because they stumble into a hole that they did not see ahead. Ever wonder the Bible pictures human beings as being like sheep? Because in some ways we are like sheep: Sheep cannot see far ahead. Sheep are easily lead astray. Sheep are defenseless. Mortals then cannot see far ahead in terms what is to come in the next minute, let alone, next day,next week next month, and even next year. Mortals are easily misled as seen in people who believe rumors which can cause havoc in our church, our community as well as our nation. Mortals are in most cases defenseless as certain things we cannot defend ourselves against such as toxics in our air and water as well as natural forces. So obviously we cannot see ahead nor think ahead. we too will fall into holes. And some holes are left open because of the negligence of others, who fail to secure paths ahead for those who come behind.

A shepherd as he leads the flock will go ahead and take his staff and drive it into the ground as he searches for holes. When he finds then he will lead the flock around them and pour oil in them so as the drive snakes out. God's Word and God's Spirit will if we listen to them will steer us clear of them to avoid falling into them, putting us on our backs or worse to be bitten by old serpent, the Devil.

Fourth and finally, a sheep cannot get off of his back under its own strength. Someone else must come alone and gently turn him upright. That is what the Savior does: He shows up and gently resets us and sets on our feet and leads us in the right direction. We too are to help those who find themselves in a world where they are upside down as taught in Galatians, chapter 6, verse 1 where the Apostle Paul, writes, Brothers and sisters, if someone is caught in a sin, you who live by the Spirit should restore that person gently. But watch yourselves, or you also may be tempted When a sheep is set right side up, he will stumble trying to get its balance and footing. And that says to us that restoration will take time, but ultimately by His grace we will make it. That word restore in the Greek New Testament, has three meanings:

- a.) It pictures setting a broken bone. Those of us who have suffered broken bones, be it a leg or an arm, know it takes weeks, if not months to heal. Some hurts especially those within take time to get over and/or get through. They is not pill that can heal the broken spirit or broken heart. Only doses of the Balm in Gilead can do that in time.
- b.) It pictures fixing a fish net. In biblical times and in some places today, people still fish by casting a net. But in time that net breaks. And it must be mended so as to be used again to catch more fish. The restoration of a child of God allows him to be recycled in winning souls, yes, fishing for souls.
- c.) It also means mental restoration,as one in times has his mind restored and his strength and faith renewed.
