Reading is fundamental but most importantly fun. It's the main reason brothers of the Xi Rho Chapter in West Memphis Arkansas decided to do their second annual Summer book drive. For the second year in a row, the brothers collected more than 300 books to be donated to "Project Lets Read." Project Lets Read decided to bring its summer literacy program back to West Memphis after its first year of success in 2021. The program accepts 80 to 100 kids each Summer and teaches the fundamentals of reading to children ages five to 17. Xi Rho decided to partner with the program of the simple fact of reading is one of the most important building blocks to learning. According to Arkansas Advocates for Children and Families in 2021 Arkansas ranked 41st in the percent of fourth graders who can read proficiently at grade level. And 69 percent of Arkansas's fourth graders are not reading at grade level, compared to 66 percent nationally. Xi Rho also donated books to children in Hughes Arkansas. The goal is to continue the book drive and grow it into one of the chapter's premiere community events.



JovVanTa Mason, Rho Theta (Omicron Upsilon), Waco, TX




As we approach this 86th year of the 9th District's existence, this 86th year of striving to exemplify the standards of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Incorporated, this 86th year of uplifting communities throughout the states of Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Oklahoma, let us reflect on the context in which this band of high-aspiring brothers with

servant mentalities was formed. Under the guidance and supervision of the sixteenth Grand Basileus, Bro. Albert Dent, and the specific direction of Bro. J.D Bowles of Nu Phi, the foundation of the 9th D was set. Emerging near the end of the Great Depression and amidst increasing social and political opposition, the expansion of Omega further into the American south was no easy feat and remains an endeavor worthy of our attention and reverence.

Bro. Bowles understood this. Born in Texas in 1905, Bowles had risen beyond his perceived position in society to obtain an education from Harvard and degrees from Fisk, the University of Kansas, and Meharry Medical College. As an educator and dean at the Houston College for Negroes (later Texas Southern University), Bowles knew firsthand the effort it would take to lift as we climb. Members of the fraternity and influential members of the African American community in Dallas exuded this understanding as well. In a city, during that time, that offered little space for African Americans to meet and fellowship outside of the white gaze, the Moorland Branch YMCA served as a haven for Black people, especially to the brothers of Omega on May 5th and 6th of 1937.

Operating within this historical context, our forebearers achieved virtually unfathomable feats. Despite discriminatory social, economic, and political practices and norms, namely Jim Crow laws and the "White Primary" in Texas, brothers of our beloved fraternity saw fit that the 9th District was set firm on solid ground and provided a template for its growth. As we approach our district's anniversary and continue the work of those who have come before us, let us remember that these developments do not and did not occur in a vacuum but emerge as responses to society's ills. The history of the 9th District is not separate from the history of African Americans seeking to create better lives for themselves. The historical context of our district's founding is embedded in the plight of Black people. Essentially, the history of the 9th District is Black History.

Relative to social impact, LSSQ was able to provide training and enhance the knowledge of the Fraternity business to Brothers from across the state of Texas, the Ninth District, and Internationally, as well as improve the relationships of the chapters within our Fraternity, and determine a positive path forward for the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. at all levels.

The Klein Forest High School HBCU Divine Nine event held on February 10, 2023, was a success. Relative to social impact, Klein Forest High School has a student population of roughly 3,500 students. This HBCU Divine Nine event impacted approximately 20% of the student population, which is about 700 kids throughout the entire Klein Forest High School student body. Students stopped by the booths and engaged with the presenters and asked questions about the different characteristics of each organization.



Exemplifying Scholarship & Uplift: Honoring Dr. Van S. Allen's 75 years of service By Bro. JovVanTa Mason, Rho Theta (Omicron Upsilon), Waco, TX



Born the eldest of nine children to a sharecropping family in Hollandale, Mississippi, on April 2nd, 1926, Van Sizar Allen is a living example of the triumphs of African Americans, a true testament of perseverance. Although he recalls the seemingly insurmountable obstacles faced by his people during his early years, he remembers being surrounded by Black families who valued education. From this support developed a deep desire to be educated and the aspiration to obtain useful knowledge. In acting upon these aspirations, Allen would go on to receive a Bachelor's degree in Biology from Tugaloo College, a Master's of Science in School Health from the University of Michigan, a graduate certificate in Alcohol Studies from Yale University, a Master's and Ph.D. in Public Health from the University of North Carolina.

Dr. Allen's love for scholarship and education did not cease at his attainments. He taught science at Bennett College for over a decade, served as Vice President of Academic Affairs at both Tugaloo and Paul Quinn College, and held a host of positions within educational organizations and agencies. Perhaps the work Dr. Allen is most noted for is his efforts working with the Southern Regional Education Board, the Technical Assistance Consortium To Improve College Services and the United Negro College Fund. In this work, Dr. Allen was charged with the uplift of historically black colleges and universities and other Black educational institutions. His critiques, presentations, and overall educational philosophy would become a mainstay in the fundraising and support efforts for the UNCF. Arguing in 1970 that "the Black colleges have the keys to the doors of education and equal employment opportunity for both blacks and whites who anticipate successful participation in the present and future American society", Dr. Allen was and remains a proven advocate of the capabilities of HBCUs. In 1975 this advocacy extended into the courtroom as Dr. Allen served as an expert witness in Ayers v. Waller, a case that addressed the underfunding of HBCUs in the state of Mississippi.

In an interview with Dr. Allen in 2022, he noted that his interest in evolving educational philosophies is even stronger at 95 years old because he understands fully that we as human beings have the potential to resolve whatever ailments that society may face. And at 95, Dr. Allen has not let age deter his efforts. He remains active within the community in Waco, Tx with the Central Texas African American Heritage Foundation and Omicron Upsilon chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc. Approaching his 75th year of service to our beloved fraternity, Dr. Allen exemplifies our cardinal principles. His achievements and efforts reflect a strict adherence to scholarship and a desire to uplift communities through education.

A Class For The Ages By Walter Hunt, Ed.D., Rho Beta Beta Chapter, Houston, Texas

On an otherwise uneventful Monday night, on January 2, 2023, during a National Football League (NFL) night-game telecast, millions of football fans, both young and old, excitedly tuned in for what was sure to be a competitive match-up between the (12-3) Buffalo Bills and the (11-4) Cincinnati Bengals. However, at approximately 8:55 PM, Buffalo Bills Safety, 24-year-old Damar Hamlin, made what would be considered by most as a routine tackle. However, that tackle would result in the football game being temporarily suspended and then subsequently postponed, while the world seemingly stood still for nine days as we sat on edge wondering if Hamlin would recover after collapsing on the football field.

We later found out that Hamlin suffered a cardiac arrest event on the field, resulting from the tackle. He had to be resuscitated, as the first responders (trainers) worked feverishly to save his life, to prevent this young man from dying during a nationally-televised NFL game. Fortunately, Hamlin was blessed to have someone proficient in CPR nearby working to help restore his heartbeat. Unfortunately, 12-year-old Elijah Jordan Brown Garcia, wasn't as lucky, as he suddenly collapsed during a light football training session on February 24, 2023. Elijah lost consciousness and lay on the ground for approximately 40 minutes before any attempts were made to resuscitate him when paramedics finally arrived. Sadly, Elijah passed away like countless other individuals who suffer a medical emergency in the company of individuals who are not properly trained to render aid when needed.

This incident and the fact that sudden cardiac death among high school athletes is a growing problem has made CPR training a huge topic in our circles, thus prompting our Houston Omega Lamplighters to lead the way. To make sure our young men are prepared for any unfortunate incidents, such as those aforementioned, we put together FREE CPR training.

On Sunday, January 22, 2023, Brother Marvin Alexander (Nu Phi), a Houston Fire Department (HFD) Chief, provided instructions on how to perform life-saving measures in case of an emergency. Brother Alexander paid the fee for those in attendance to receive their CPR certification, upon successful completion of the training.

The Lamplighters were engaged and attentive for the entirety of the three-hour session, as they learned life saving techniques that could potentially save a life one day. While we hope that none of them ever need to put what was learned during this training into practice, we wanted to be sure they are properly equipped with the necessary tools to save a life if ever in a life-or-death situation.

69 Years and Counting! By Bro. Terrance Kinard/ Sigma Tau Chapter/ El Paso, Texas

As Black History Month has come and nearly gone, I wanted to highlight some of the accomplishments of my Chapter. As I pondered on different stories to write about, from which I had plenty to choose, one Brother continued to stand out, Brother Hoyt Lafeyette Ward, Sr., affectionately known as '54. As a young Brother in the Fraternity, I have become accustomed to Brother Ward being the voice of reasoning, but while in attendance at his Black History speech, I stood in awe as he captivated the crowd, commanded the room, and eloquently answered every question. This year marks 69 years of his continuous service in our prestigious Fraternity. Astrologically, the number 69 is the number of balance, harmony, and cooperation, in which Brother Ward displays all these characteristics, and when we view this number in a reading it is a sign of peace and tranquility.



Brother Ward was born July 22, 1935, in Bokchito, Oklahoma to the late Mr. Edmond and Mrs. Clorie Ward. He is the widower of Mrs. Mattie (Delta Sigma Theta), the love of his life, and is the proud Father of three children: Hoyt L. Ward II, Zandra Ward, and Sonja Coleman. The town Bokchito is of Choctaw Indian descent, which encompasses Brother Ward's family lineage, dating back to his grandfather. He had 11 siblings, several transitioned before he was born, he's the youngest son and the only college graduate.

Brother Ward attended Langston University, which was the only college that African Americans could attend in Oklahoma during the time he graduated High School. Oklahoma became a state in 1907 and was segregated until 1963. Brother Ward studied Agriculture with a specialization in Diary Science. He was also in ROTC for 2 years before the program was terminated at Langston University. While in College Brother Ward was initiated into Omega Phi Psi Fraternity Inc on April 10, 1954, Phi Psi Chapter, Langston University. Brother Ward was mentored by our 32nd Grand Basileus Dr. Benjamin L. Livingston and they remained close friends until GB 32 entered Omega Chapter. He joined the Fraternity because during that time people of color did not have many opportunities in the job field, Afro-Americans were not allowed to join other professional organizations, and members of Historically Black Fraternities would help each other with getting into different sectors of the workplace.

Honoring Bro. Ward

In 1955 Brother Ward applied for employment in Diary research and was deemed highly qualified by the employer, but as of today he still has not been called to work. He graduated from Langston University in May 1956 and was drafted into the Army a month later. Brother Ward served in the US Army for 29 years and retired in 1983, as an Air Defense Artillery Sergeant Major at Ft. Bliss, TX. He was stationed all over the world during the Vietnam Era and was also assigned to the "Special Unit: Desert Rock Atomic Proving Ground" outside of Las Vegas, Nevada where atmospheric and underground nuclear testing was conducted. While assigned to Desert Rock Atomic Proving Ground Brother Ward was exposed to ionizing radiation that was 10 times as potent as agent orange. He's currently battling prostate, blood, and colon cancers and still makes time to do his duty that is best: mentor Brothers, attend meetings, and walk the Concordia Cemetery. He retired from the civilian sector in 1994.

Brother Hoyt Ward, '54, is the epitome of Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance, and Uplift. He is a Life Member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated, and has held several positions in the Fraternity, including Basileus times three for Sigma Tau Chapter. Brother Ward and his late wife were instrumental in chartering the Buffalo Soldier Chapter at Ft. Bliss and he continues to be a pillar in the El Paso community. He is a member of the 50/50 club for the McCall Center, and a devout member of St. Paul's United Methodist Church, and his guidance and wisdom continue to inspire all that he encounters.

Christmas with da Ques – The Purple Glove Foundation Eta Mu Mu Chapter / Denton, Texas By Bro. Dwayne Wright

In January 2023, Psi Alpha finalized an agreement with the George Gervin Academy to facilitate the Psi Alpha on-campus mentoring program. The agreed-upon mentoring program consists of 10 mentees meeting for one hour every Thursday afternoon. The Mentoring Committee held four sessions in February. Each session was held from 11:45 am-12:45 pm.

On February 2, the Tyre Nichols situation was discussed with the mentees. The discussion was an open forum for the mentees to express their views on the situation, police interaction in general, and any questions they had. The conversation evolved into a discussion on their prior experiences with police. The mentors provided insight, encouragement, and practical tools for interacting with the police.

The February 9 session was primarily related to a team-building exercise. The mentees were broken into teams and were given two minutes to strategize on how to build a tower out of cups, plates, and index cards. Then each team was given 5 minutes to build the tower without any verbal communication. This was done twice. The mentees were engaged in the exercise and it produced positive results. The overall theme of the exercise was communication and building a solid foundation in life. The tower was used as an example of starting with a solid foundation as opposed to building as high and as fast as possible.

At the request of the GGA staff, the February 16th session focused on bullying. We discussed different types of bullying, what to do if the mentees witness bullying, etc. We also discussed their interactions with the authority figures in the school and how that can be perceived as bullying. The conversation pivoted to the mentees being leaders in the school and deterring any bullying. Leadership by the mentees was stressed and communicated during the session.

The February 23rd session focused on discussing the YLC/STEM Conference as well as goal setting. Each mentee was asked to state one goal for the year. They then had to discuss their progress toward that goal, things they could do daily to reach that goal, etc. Finally, the mentors provided a challenge related to that goal which was accepted by each mentee. In every case, the mentees communicated their goals well were honest with their progress and discussed things they could do differently to achieve that goal.

His calling was always about high achievement, order, discipline, and serving the needs of others, manifesting as a lifelong endeavor with a dedication to providing for his family, working as a church usher in a well variety of roles with Omega Psi Fraternity, the Van Courtlandt Social Club, a lifetime member of the NAACP and as a board member of the Davis-Scott YMCA.

Clarence Hill, who departed this earth on February 3, 2023, was born May 14, 1937, in Sweet Home (Lavaca County) Texas. He was baptized at Corinth Baptist Church in 1950. He completed grades 1 through 8 at Sweet Home Colored School and graduated from Asberry High School, the Yoakum Colored School in 1954 Yoakum as Valedictorian of his class. He earned Bachelor of Science degrees in Mathematics and Industrial Engineering from Prairie View A&M in 1958. He received a Master's Degree in Mathematics and a Certification in Education Administration in 1986. Clarence started his teaching career at E. A. Greer High School for Blacks in El Campo in 1958.

During his stay in El Campo, he met and married Jewel Rae Davis in 1962. To this union, Tina Sheree Hill and Clarence Edward Hill Jr. were born. In 1964, Clarence and Jewel moved to Wharton, Texas where he taught Mathematics and Science at Wharton Training High School for Blacks. In 1966, he accepted a position at Elgin High School in Elgin Texas as Head of the Science and Mathematics Department. In 1968, the Hill family relocated to San Antonio when SAISD began integration, accepting a position as a Mathematics teacher at Phillis Wheatley High School. In 1969, he was transferred to Thomas Jefferson High School to teach college preparatory math and science, where he remained until he retired in 1995. He was also an adjunct math professor at St. Phillips College from 1969 to 2003. He began working at Lewis Funeral Home in 1995 and served as the Business Manager/ Chief Financial Officer until 2020.

Clarence Hill joined the St. Paul Paul Methodist Church in 1968 and soon became a part of the Board of Ushers. He was elected Board President in 1977 and led the organization for 28 years. Clarence joined the San Antonio City Wide Ushers in 1977. He has been honored as Usher of the Year by both St. Paul United Methodist Church and the City Wide Ushers numerous times and was elected to the Texas Usher Hall of Fame. Clarence has also served St. Paul United Methodist Church as President of the Board of Trustees and Church Treasurer. Clarence pledged Omega Psi Fraternity in 1971 where he served as Basileus and Keeper of Finance among other offices with the Psi Alpha Chapter in San Antonio.

East Side physician honored with Baptist Health System Humanitarian Award (KSAT 12 Article) By Jessie Degollado and Luis Cienfuegos

SAN ANTONIO – When his patients congratulate him for the Humanitarian Award from the Baptist Health System, Dr. Leo Edwards ('83 – Psi Alpha) said he tells them, "It's y'all who made it possible."

Edwards has spent more than 40 years in the East Side community where he was born and raised, helping and healing those like Judy Clay Jenkins.

Jenkins said it's Edwards' kindness that's earned him recognition by the Baptist Health System. After Dr. Edwards heard there was a patient who became hungry while waiting to be seen, "he went and got her something to eat," Jenkins said. "Then, he also had a cab to take her home." Jenkins said that's the kind of doctor Edwards is to all his patients.

"He's the heart. He really is. He's the heart," Jenkins said. Edwards said, "It's in my nature. It's just kind of how it is. I've been brought up like that." He said his parents were community-minded and, like him, active in the church at Holy Redeemer Catholic Church.

Whether it's helping a patient get a medical apparatus they can't afford or simply listening to what's on their minds, Edwards said, "You treat them like they're your family."

The irony of Edwards being honored by the Baptist Health System was that Edwards has a deep personal connection to downtown Baptist, dating back to the day he was born.

Since it was a segregated hospital back then, Edwards said, "We had to go to a section of the hospital that was for Blacks." Yet, when he was born not breathing, he said a white nurse gave him mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

Edwards said, "She didn't hesitate to save my life." To be recognized by the Baptist Health System all these years later, Edwards said, "It's really cool, especially at this point in time in my life."

Psalm 51 2 Chronicles 7: 11-14 Mark 11: 1-11 Subject: Hit the Reset Button

We know that as the saying goes, "Stuff happens" in our lives. Sometimes your phone. Your cable signal is lost. And your computer freezes up. When this situation occurs you hit the reset button.

These biblical texts speak of hitting the reset button. In 2 Chronicles 7, verses 11-14 tells that God says when the nation of Israel suffers through disasters, if his people repent and turn from their sinful ways, he would hear from heaven and heal the land. Psalm 51 is David's prayer of repentance after Nathan the prophet confronts him about his adultery with Bathsheba and his covering it up by putting her husband Uriah the Hittite on the front line in a battle where he has killed Jesus during his triumphant ride into Jerusalem on PalmSundayallowsthe Jewish establishment to hit the reset button by embracing him as King, Lord, and Savior. Palm Sunday begins Passion Week which is climaxed on Good Friday when in the redemptive plan the reset button is hit that changing the course of history.

There is a tradition that says that there were three processions into Jerusalem that day.

The first was Pontius Pilate leading a military entourage into the city to be ready to suppress any unrest from the Jews during Passover as the presence of Rome was hated. And there were those who believe in ending occupation by any means necessary.

Second, there was the High Priest, leading a vast herd of sheep that would be offered as a sacrifice later in the week. It was the rule that prior to being offered as a sacrifice the lambs had to put up for four days to be observed for any blemishes that would disqualify them from being offered.

And third, but not the least Jesus was riding into the city on a donkey as a symbol of humility. But as the Lamb of God, he enters the city so the religious leaders could get a closer look and see that he had no blemishes in any way. And hopefully, they would see that and push the reset button and set their nation on a different course.

We know that this virus has laterally stopped the world. Every human agency has been touched and put in the park: Education as schools, colleges, and universities are closed with students completing their work online. Commerce is stopped as businesses .are closed, resulting in jitters on the stock market and rising unemployment rates. Government shows itself as inept and cannot protect the public as leadership appears would rather protect their interest instead of the public good. Sports are stopped as areas and ballparks are empty. Church as we know it is shut down in terms of assembly and is forced to reassess its purpose in terms of missions and ministries. God

then got the attention of the world and did not fire a shot or drop a bomb, but he moved with a deadly microcosm we cannot see.

And this has caused us to rethink what matters: People since they cannot work and the children are home are rediscovering family time and enjoying meals together among other things We see our government is flawed. Commerce and business are so affected that we learn that money is not everything as we learn that real worth is not net worth but self-worth in ourselves and others. The church has had to rethink how we minister and what we minister as we cut the chase and present Jesus Christ as he is to men as they are. And there is a rediscovery of the power of prayer as prayer meetings are popping up everywhere even in the halls of the hospitals. Truly on all fronts, there is a need to hit the reset button. And that truth says several things to us:

First, hitting the reset button means to understand the frailties and failings of everything human. Everything on earth is limited so life does crash and all we love sometimes comes tumbling down, just as your phone, tablet, or computer does. There are limits to what men can do. We cannot for our survival declare the truth when we don't like it as "fake news" or "a hoax. The universe is everywhere and rests on truth, be scientific, moral, and so forth as it is objective and absolute.

Second, resets deal with internal matters and not so much cosmetic and external. It is by resets that updates are made effective. We know this crisis has caused us to rethink and readjust our priorities. And we know resets rearrange software, removing any negative for the machine to run better. In a time of a crunch or a crash, we discover what people are made up of as either the best or the worst comes forth. But in the process of being reset within, we see our true need for things eternal.

And third, resets are very simple to do, just hit that button, with a simple touch. Remember in the Scriptures, great things with just a simple touch as lives were changed:

Moses, touched a rock with his staff, and water gushed forth to quench Israel's thirst in the wilderness

A stone touched Goliath's forehead and sinks in and he is brought down.

A tree branch touches the water and iron floats

Salt touches a spring and the waters are healed

The prophet Isaiah's lips are touched with a burning coal from the altar and he is prepared for his prophetic ministry.

Jeremiah's lips are touched by the hand of the Lord and he is ready to serve And in the New Testament, God has touched us in Jesus Christ. And when he touched things happened

But remember, on Calvary, he touched a cross and changed it into a throne as he said If I be lifted up from the earth I will draw all men unto me." And in touching that cross he hit the reset button to make us look at ourselves, and change us on the inside, resetting the course of human history in dying for you and for me, and on the third day morning, Sunday morning he got up with all power in his hands, touching death, hell and the grave, confiscating the sting of death and ramshackle the grave robbing it of his victory.


