

Bro. Warren Joseph Green was born in New Orleans, Louisiana, on January 5, 1943, the son of the late Catheline Taylor Buckner and the late Wilfred Green. He was called home to eternal rest on January 23, 2011. He was joined in holy matrimony to Helen Smith Green. The union was blessed with two daughters. He was educated in the public schools of New Orleans and was a graduate of Walter L. Cohen High School Class of 1960. Bro. Green attended Grambling State University where he became an Omega man on 12/15/1961 through Gamma Gamma chapter. He graduated from Grambling State University in 1964. He also attended Loyola University for certifications in Mathematics and Vocational Education. He received a Masters in Vocational Education from Louisiana State University.

Bro. Green served his undergraduate chapter in several capacities. He served as Vice Basileus, Dean of Pledges, Chairman of the Talent Hunt Committee and also a member and leader of the Omega/Delta Homework help Center, which was held the schools library. In 1965, Bro. Green joined Rho Phi chapter in New Orleans, LA. and had been a financial member of Rho Phi since that day and was financial his entire 50 years in Omega. As a member of Rho Phi chapter, Bro. Green had served in several capacities. In 1978 he was elected Keeper of Finance and in 1981, Bro. Green was elected as Basileus of Rho Phi and served a term and made major improvements

Bro. Green had attended 48 consecutive Ninth District Meetings in his Life in Omega. He has served as a Ninth District Undergraduate Advisor for 12 consecutive years. He was named Ninth District Omega Man of the Year in 1988 and again in 2003. Bro. Green served as the Ninth District's Achievement Week Chairman for many years. Bro. Green missed one Ninth District meeting including: Ninth District Undergraduate Summits, Leadership Meetings and Council Meetings in 50 years. Bro. Green registered for 15 Grand Conclaves as well as the 76th Grand Conclave during past fiscal year. Bro. Green attended and registered for every Leadership Conference since their inception. Bro. Green had also been registered at the last 5 International Undergraduate Summits. Bro. Green is Life Member (317) and had often attended OLMF Board meetings.


Brother Stewart is also the Omega representative for the Annual United Negro College Fund. The Brothers of Omega always play a big role in this event, providing planning guidance and the logistics necessary to conduct this great fundraiser. Due to our strong participation, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. is the only Greek organization listed as a Corporate Sponsor for the UNCF Houston Walk.

Alvin Stevenson Adopt-A-School drive. The beach cleanup is held in conjunction with the Texas Land Office, which holds two state-wide beach cleanups annually. The Alvin Stevenson Adopt-A-School Drive benefits L.A. Morgan Elementary School in Galveston, TX. This program was named after Brother Alvin Stevenson, a charter member of Rho Nu and a Brother that has been active in the Fraternity for 54 years.

The chapter also makes annual donations to the Women's Crisis Center and Rat T. Sheppard little league in Galveston. Rho Nu joined forces with the Houston Area Urban League to conduct voter registration drives, a HIV/AIDS awareness program, and a fundraiser to benefit the Urban League.

International Undergraduate Omega Man of the Year

During the past Conclave held in Raleigh, North Carolina, Alpha Delta Lambda chapter's immediate past Basileus Christian Menefee received the highest honor an undergraduate brother could receive. He was awarded International Undergraduate Omega Man of the Year. This award was a humbling experience that caught brother Menefee by surprise. He knew that he was receiving the Herman Dreer Leadership Award, but was not aware of the award for International Undergraduate Omega Man of the Year.



Alpha Delta Lambda Chapter (ADL) was chartered on February 1, 2008, with brother Menefee serving as its first Basileus. During that time ADL received numerous recognitions and awards. Within the chapter's first year chapter, it won the 2008 9th District Marchdown competition and represented the District at the Birmingham Conclave. In the Fall of 2008 Alpha Delta Lambda led a voter drive titled Walk for Change. During Walk for Change, students at The University of Texas at San Antonio participated in a march that took them from the university's UC to the poll site. The group cast their votes for the 2008 Presidential election. The march was very successful and garnered local media attention in the San Antonio metropolitan area.

Before leaving for law school, Brother Menefee helped lead ADL as it finished the Spring 2010 semester with the highest GPA among NPHC Fraternities and third highest GPA among all fraternities on campus. This academic accomplishment was also reached during the Fall 2009 semester. With the chapter earning so many accomplishments, Greek Life officials saw fit to nominate the Alpha Delta Lambda chapter for Fraternity of the Year which is the highest award for Greek fraternities on campus. This award is based on grades, community service, and scholarship donations. Unfortunately, the chapter did not win the award but they still continuing to uplift the campus. Thanks to brother Menefee, the bar has been raised for the other members in the chapter as well as other Greeks on the campus. GE/OMEGA LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Ninth District Presents Largest Compliment For 2011

Ninth District, USA—January 2011. During the Undergraduate Summit held in Charlotte, NC in January of 2011, Immediate past Ninth District Representative, Brother Willie Hinchin along with a number of key Undergraduate Advisors of the Ninth District played an influential role in Undergraduate submissions to the GE/Omega Leadership Program Selection Committee's request for applicants from the Ninth District. After having had the opportunity to meet with 39th Grand Basileus, Brother Andrew Ray, Ph.D. and the G.E. / Omega Leadership Team, insight as to what General Electric expected from Omega and Its Undergraduate Membership was provided to all District Level interested parties. It was further indicated to those Ninth District Summit participants who were interested in the G.E. Program how important it would be to fully understand some key protocols. Those were proper Business Dress, Appropriate Grooming, Professionalism and Verbal Skills. It was stressed that these protocols should be adhered to if any Undergraduate had a reasonable expectation of being considered for participation in this coveted Internship Program. Advisor efforts were also said to have played a key role in preparation efforts.

On March 02, 2011, The GE/Omega Leadership Program Committee, led by Brother Michael J. Foust, Ph.D., Aviation Section Manager in Combustion Aero Technology & Design at G.E., chose 37 out of 60 applicants to participate in the 2011 GE/Omega Leadership Program. One Undergraduate continued participation from the Class of 2010 making a total of 38 Omega Undergraduates for the year 2011. At least 15 of the 26 submissions from the Ninth District were chosen. Per Brother Foust, the Ninth District presented the largest District Level compliment to this year's Program. Although 38 were selected, the Fraternity was afforded 40 positions for the Spring/Summer 2011 Internship Program.

The GE/Omega effort is a one year program for collegiate men only whose focus majors are Mathematics, Science, Engineering & Technology, Computer Science and Business (Finance, Management & Marketing). Participants are required to have at least a 3.2 and higher grade point average (on a 4.0 scale), an active / financial Member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. and at least be a Sophomore, Junior or Senior.

The Ninth District has been fortunate to have had a wealth of Undergraduate Members to be selected for participation in the GE Internship Program for the past three years. This year, the District has representation from each of its four member states and has two schools/Chapters to have Members to participate for a second year. Those Chapters are Gamma Gamma Chapter of Grambling State University and Phi Beta Chapter of Jarvis Christian College.

The District has four Graduate Advisor Overseers, appointed by the District Representative, who are charged with ensuring that each of their Chapters appropriately submit all Undergraduate Members from their state Chapters who met the criteria to qualify for the Program. These advisors are: Brother Dr. Paul Adams of Arkansas; Brother Frederick Thomas of Louisiana; Brother Tevin Williams of Oklahoma and Brother Spergeon Holley of Texas.

The Area State Representatives and the approved Undergraduate Advisors from each Chapter contacted the Undergraduate Members and secured the requested grade point averages and declared majors. This combined effort produced four Chapters from the Ninth District each having two Members to be selected for the Program. These Advisors were: Advisor, Brother Dr. Bobby Burkes-Gamma Gamma Chapter of Grambling State University (Students: Brother Lennie Andrew, "Accounting" and Brother David Stuckman, "Business Mgmt. /Computer Info. Systems"); Advisor, Brother Brandon Weathers--Pi Kappa Chapter of The University of Arkansas at Little Rock (Students: Brother Arburt Robinson, "Mass Communications" and Brother Marvin Lowe, "Biology"); Advisor, Brother Frederick Thomas--Beta Sigma Chapter of Southern University at Baton Rouge-(Students: Brother Justin Coleman, "Electronic Engineering Technology and Brother Marlon Hamilton, "Mechanical Engineering"); Advisor, Brother Eric Willis--Eta Theta Chapter of The University of Texas at Austin (Students: Brother Ernesto Slater, "Economics" and Brother Christian Randolph, "Kinesiology")

There was also an independent effort on the part of other Ninth District Advisors to seek out qualified Undergraduate Members for the Program. Graham--Pi Delta Chapter of University of Oklahoma at Norman (Student: Brother Ewane Masango, "Finance/Philosophy"); Advisor, Brother Dr. Weldon Walton--Chi Delta Delta of Baylor University (Student: Brother Todd Adams, "Economics"); Advisor, Brother Louis Simmons--Sigma Lambda Chapter of Texas Christian University (Student: Brother Bryon Bailey, "Entrepreneurial Management/Finance"); Advisor, Immediate Past Ninth District Representative, Brother Willie F. 

Phi Iota Iota Chapter ‘s Blood Drive

LaPlace, La. -Members of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Phi Iota Iota Chapter of LaPlace, Louisiana and The Blood Center of New Orleans collaborated to hold the Chapter’s Annual Dr. Charles R. Drew Blood Drive, Saturday, September 25, 2010 at The Airline Athletic Center in LaPlace, La.

Being that Dr. Charles R. Drew, was the developer of techniques for storing and transfusing blood plasma and the 1st Director of the American Red Cross Blood Bank, we feel that “The Dr. Charles Drew Blood Drive is one of our most important Social Action programs held annually”, said Will Peoples, Basileus of Phi Iota Iota Chapter that supports the River Parishes area. “Blood gives life.” For every 1 blood donation, 3 lives can be saved according to The Blood Center of New Orleans whose mission is to provide a quality supply of blood components to meet the needs of the surrounding communities. The Blood Center of New Orleans is also the primary supplier of blood, blood components, and plasma derivatives to local hospitals throughout southern Louisiana.



The Dr. Charles R. Drew Blood Drive is one of many Health initiatives the Fraternity and its over 100,000 members take part in annually. This year our Blood Drive collected over 25 units of blood, which surpasses the average contribution within the community. “The little bit of time a donor takes through the course of a year means a lifetime to patients in our area who need blood to remain healthy”, said Randolph Sylve, Phi Iota Iota Social Actions Chairman. “The units of blood collected this year at The Blood Drive represents saving over 75 lives and since blood cannot be manufactured, patients rely heavily on the generosity of volunteer blood donors everyday”, said one of the medical staff administering the drive. It is estimated that every 3 seconds someone needs blood.

The event was also an opportunity to get other black Greek Organizations visible in the area. Omega Psi Phi Fraternity is currently the only official black Greek Organization with an active chapter in the River Parish Area and is taking a leading role in forming River Parish Greeks Organization, which consists of members of other Black Greek organizations who reside in the area.

Will Peoples agree that it is important for Greeks to stand up in the community. “There’s a lot of work that needs to be done in this area. Events like this give us an opportunity to Shine Our Light.”

Pi Omicron’s Protest Against Prostate Cancer

The men of Pi Omicron Chapter of Omega Psi Phi have instituted a protest against prostate cancer with the assistance of community partners. The Omegas of Greater Little Rock, the Derek Lewis Foundation and Pi Omicron chapter raised funds to support the Arkansas Prostate Cancer Foundation (APCF). Members of Pi Omicron chapter and two Arkansas State Legislators Fred Allen and Tommy Baker presented a check in the amount of \$5000 to the Arkansas Prostate Cancer Foundation Wednesday September 29, 2010.



The APCF was formed in 2000 with a mission to promote awareness, encourage timely detection and support improved treatment of prostate cancer in Arkansas. The APCF believes that access to information and treatment should be available to all men in Arkansas.

Prostate cancer is responsible for more deaths than any other cancer, except for lung cancer. The American Cancer Society estimated that 186,320 new cases of prostate cancer were diagnosed in the United States during 2008. About 1 man in 6 will be diagnosed with prostate cancer during his lifetime, but only 1 man in 34 will die of it. A little over 1.8 million men in the United States are survivors of prostate cancer.

It's not clear what causes prostate cancer. Doctors know that prostate cancer begins when some cells in your prostate become abnormal. These cells start accumulating and form a tumor that can grow in the prostate.

A man with prostate cancer may not have any symptoms. For men who do have symptoms, the common symptoms include: urinary problems, difficulty having an erection, blood in the urine or semen and frequent pain in the back, hips, or upper thighs. If you have any of these symptoms, you should tell your doctor so that problems can be diagnosed and treated.

Your doctor can check for prostate cancer before you have any symptoms. During an office visit, your doctor will ask about your personal and family medical history. You may have a Digital rectal exam to check your prostate for hard or lumpy areas. You may have a Blood test for prostate-specific antigen (PSA) levels in your blood. Prostate cancer may also cause a high PSA level.

American with Diabetes Association Step out to fight Diabetes Walk-A-Thon

Rho Xi Chapter (Freeport, Texas) – On November 12, 2010, the men of the Rho Xi Chapter participated in the Americans with Diabetes Walk-A-Thon held in Houston, Texas. The Rho Xi chapter teamed up with the brothers of the Houston Area Coalition to make a difference in the fight against diabetes on behalf of friends and family members who battle the disease. The monies raised by the chapter will go towards research to find a cure as well as to raise awareness of the disease that affects predominantly African-Americans and other minority groups. Several hundred friends, family and members of the community turned out to participate in the walk.

"A friend is always loyal, and a brother is born to help in time of need" (Proverbs 17:17). The Brothers of Pi Omicron Chapter displayed their loyalty by supporting breast cancer survivors in the 2010 Arkansas Komen Race for the Cure as part of the "3 Miles of Men" October 16 in downtown Little Rock. More than 45,850 breast cancer survivors and supporters participated in the Arkansas



Komen Race for the Cure and Omega Psi Phi-Pi Omicron Chapter took the shield to the streets to raise the spirits of female participants and encourage cancer survivors to the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure is the world's largest fundraising event for breast cancer. The Arkansas Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure was founded in 1992 and held its first race in 1994. Their goals are to raise funds to fight against breast cancer, to raise awareness of the disease, to celebrate those who have survived breast cancer, and memorialize those who have not.

Breast cancer is a type of cancer where cells in the breast divide and grow without normal control. By the time a lump is large enough to feel, it may have been growing for as long as 10 years. However, some tumors can be aggressive, and grow much more rapidly.

In 1975 approximately 32 white women per 100,000 died of breast cancer, but by 2005, that figure had dropped to 23 per 100,000. For black women though, mortality increased somewhat over the same period, rising from 30 per 100,000 black women in 1975 to 33 per 100,000 in 2005.

Thanks to events like the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure, and generous contributions from community partners, and sponsors the Komen Foundation has become the largest source of nonprofit funds dedicated to the fight against breast cancer in the world.

As anchors in the Komen Three Miles of Men the Brothers of Pi Omicron chapter displayed how true friends strengthen and help each other. "Two people are better off than one, for they can help each other succeed. If one person falls, the other can reach out and help. But someone who falls alone is in real trouble. Likewise, two people lying close together can keep each other warm. But how can one be warm alone? A person standing alone can be attacked and defeated, but two can stand back-to-back and conquer. Three are even better, for a triple-braided cord is not easily broken" (Ecclesiastes 4:9-12). The brothers of the Brothers of Pi Omicron Chapter of Omega Psi Phi are committed to preserving the health and safety of the women in our communities.

Message From The Stop The Violence Chair - By Brother Nathaniel Mitchell Sr.

At this point as members of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. it isn't our place to attempt to lay blame, point fingers, speculate, or otherwise involve ourselves with the incident, other than to offer support and prayers to the Families involved, especially our own Brother Jamail E. Johnson; offer support to our other Brothers who were present and or wounded during the incident and must press on; or offer support to and for the community at-large. Our place, at this point is to step aside and allow the legal process to proceed. In addition to that Brothers, let's us not forget that we serve a "Forgiving Lord," and with that having been said, let us also share prayers for the "Families of the young men who did the shooting."

In the days and months to come discussions will be directed towards forgiveness, understanding, and hope, but will we truly embrace these three elements? As mentioned before, forgiveness MUST be within each of us, so let that forgiveness begin with prayers for the accused and their families. Those two young men had families, who today are about as crushed as we are. Those two young men have families are, today, shying away from neighbors, media, and in some cases other family members because they don't have the same answers we're searching for, WHY!

Mentorship: Provides opportunities for us to work with at-risk youth who could very possibly be a trigger man, at some point in the future, who is welding a weapon in the face of your son or daughter, wife or mother. Proper PrePlanning Prevents

Adoption: No, I'm not speaking of adopting a youth and bringing them into your home, however that will work. What I'm speaking about is adopting a School, a Church, a Youth Group, or any group of youth that you chose to embrace and inspire to be like you; God Fearing, Educated Christian Men.

Presentations: Go into the schools, churches, meetings, etc. and offer your expertise and advice, while presenting yourselves as the Professional Men we are. Rho Nu partners with the Resource and Crisis Center of Galveston

Galveston, TX - On October 16, 2010 the Brothers of Rho Nu partnered with the Resource and Crisis Center of Galveston to conduct the inaugural Purple Ribbon Project. West Memphis, Arkansas- Xi Rho Chapter held its 1st Annual Stop the Violence Program at the Wonder Elementary School located in West Memphis. The Chairman of the committee Brother Reginald Weeks (Arkansas Department of Federal Corrections in Forrest City, AR) teamed up with Brother Eddie West (Inspector) with the West Memphis Police Department (WMPD), Drug Task Force, and the keynote speaker was Robin L. Cooper (founder The Exodus Foundation) which is a non-profit organization dealing directly with domestic violence. The program is attempting to touch the lives of every young man from elementary through high school and steer from violence. There were approximately 150 young men who participated in the program.

The program began with demonstrations from the Crittenden County Drug Task Force dog, which showed the crowd how it's able to find drugs. Ms. Cooper shared her personal story with the young men on how she overcame the abuse of domestic violence. Brother Weeks also spoke to the audience about the consequences of making bad choices in life. After the program, the brothers of Xi Rho Chapter were on hand to answer questions or concerns, the brothers also held a round table discussion with the young men, in discussing issues of the young men of today. The program was such a success, the brothers of Xi Rho, were given an accommodation from the Principal of the school. Other schools in the district have requested the Omegas to present the program at their school as well.

Xi Rho's Adopt a Highway project



Theta Alpha Chapter Celebrates 75 Years of Service By: Don R. Smith, II

Dallas, TX - On April 29th 1935 (Oracle, June 1935) seven professional men established the Theta Alpha chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. These seven men George L. Allen Sr, E. Homer Brown, Frank H. Jordan, Jr, William T. Burke, Charles Fields, Bernard Blackman and Rodman Doyle set the foundation for a strong graduate chapter that would celebrate 75 years of fraternal brotherhood among 300 Omega Men and guests on October 9th, 2010. Among the 300 in attendance were 13 past Theta Alpha Basileis including Immediate Past Grand Basileus Bro. Warren G. Lee along with current Basileus Bro. Zaphery L. Williams.

The celebration, "A Black Tie Affair," took place at the historic Fairmont Hotel in Dallas, Texas and was complete with a live band and formal program hosted by none other than master of ceremony and current president of the Dallas Black Chamber of Commerce, Bro. Charles O'Neal.

Ninth (9th) District Representative Bro. Shawn Brewer spoke with masterful eloquence when praising Theta Alpha for its many achievements and efforts in the community as a chapter. As an example, Bro. Brewer highlighted Theta Alpha's mentoring efforts through the Omega Sparks program. With an emphasis on Christian Manhood, Bro. Brewer spoke of Theta Alpha as a long standing pillar in the 9th district and international body.



The chapter was presented with a gift on behalf of Grand Basileus Dr. Andrew Ray by Bro. James W. Jordan, his Chief of Staff. The gift, the cover and pages from the June 1935 issue of the Oracle describing the organization of Theta Alpha chapter in Dallas, Texas. Gracing the cover of this issue was 15th Grand Basileus (1935 – 1937), Bro. William E. Baugh. In the article, Keeper of Records and Seal, Chas. Fillmore Fields goes on to describe the events surrounding the organization of Theta Alpha chapter at the Maria Morgan Branch of the Y.W.C.A. on Monday night April 29th, 1935.



Psi Alpha Chapter – 70 years young – November 1, 1940- 2010 By: Bro. Scott L. Earle

On Saturday, October 30, 2010 the Brothers of Psi Alpha Chapter gathered to celebrate 70 years of service to the Alamo City. In 1940 eight young professional men who had become members of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated during their college years, decided that the time was right to form a Graduate Chapter here in the City of San Antonio. After compiling all of the necessary information and paperwork and complying with the National Body's Guidelines the Local Chapter was chartered by the Supreme Council of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated on November 1, 1940 and given the name of Psi Alpha. Brother Doctor W. C. Hurd was the first Basileus. The Charter members were: Brothers W. C. Hurd, S. D. Kane, Dr. M. L. Preacher, Paul Chretien, Ernest M. Foxx, Valmo Bellinger, Dr. Richard Kidd, and G. P. Inge. The chapter was established as a lifetime membership chapter - a newly created tier of commitment within the fraternity.



A lifetime member demonstrated the pinnacle of commitment and dedication to the fraternity; pledging his life to being an active member of Omega Psi Phi, exhibiting its ideals and principles in all aspects of his life. A lifetime membership chapter would radiate a degree of passion, experience and vision that would be unique in the fraternity.

Since its beginning in 1940 Psi Alpha's members and programs have steadily grown. Over the past sixty years plus it has awarded scholarships to many promising college-bound students, brought over 350 men of the highest ideals and strongest character into the folds of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. and has established itself as an instrumental organization in the community service of Bexar County and surrounding counties. In 1960 the Chapter hosted the 46th National Conclave which was a great accomplishment for the Chapter.

In the late 70s Psi Alpha Chapter brothers came together to buy their first piece of real estate, establishing a Fraternity House at 342 Vine Street, San Antonio, Texas.

The commitment to achievement on the part of the brothers of Psi Alpha Chapter in the new millennium has been evidenced by the development of a community outreach Public Access Television Show called the "Omega Forum".

On February 19th, 2003 Psi Alpha Chapter purchased its 2nd Fraternity House within two decades. This time moving into a Historic residence in San Antonio, a house once owned by one of the leading citizens of San Antonio (The Rigsby Family).

The momentum of Psi Alpha continued into 2004 as the chapter garnered its first 9th District Chapter of the Year Award at the District Meeting in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Brother Greg Thompson was recognized as 9th District Omega Man of the Year and he eventually became the first Psi Alpha chapter brother to receive the coveted International Omega Man of the Year at the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Grand Conclave in St. Louis, Missouri in July of 2004. Psi Alpha repeated as the Back to Back 9th District Chapter of the Year in March of 2005 at the District Meeting in Monroe, Louisiana.

At the 74th Grand Conclave in Little Rock, Arkansas July 19 - 28, 2006 Psi Alpha Chapter was selected as the Fraternal Year 2004 Social Action Chapter of the Year,

Psi Alpha's successes have been numerous and far-reaching. Its future represents continued opportunities to creatively address the needs of the African American community and positively impact upon the lives of those whom it serves.

Each decade from 1930 to the present was represented at the celebration in addition to the Undergraduates of Alpha Delta Lambda Chapter which made the event special and showed why the Chapter is a success. Having so many Brothers in attendance to celebrate this milestone along with the Chapters many accomplishments showed that Psi Alpha will be around the Alamo City for decades to come.

Students listened eagerly as she recounted her personal experiences at SMU, including performing a sit-in in then-President Tate's office.

Her experiences at SMU helped to shape the school into what it is today.

The 1960s marked an era of student turmoil and unrest. After years of being ignored and neglected, African American students were not going to take it anymore.

"Students had started to recognize the power that they had," Sanders said.

Power was the necessity in order for students to change things. Not only was the small population of black students offended by Kappa Alpha Order's Old South Week, which included the confederate flag being hung on campus, they were also concerned that the university did not have any black professors nor offer any sort of African American studies programs.

Despite its size, the small group of black students banded together in 1969 in order to help bridge the gap between themselves and the university

"We were small, but we were still a part of the university," Sanders said. "We didn't come in on a discounted tuition. We were here with all the costs and all the rights, or so we thought, of any other student."

Together the group, which by 1969 included 33 students, marched down to Tate's office in order to discuss what needed to be changed at SMU.

"We were very calm. We stated the list of demands that we had and he told us, 'get out of my office, go back to class, and don't come back,'" Sanders said.

Tate's cold demeanor only made the student's more determined to fight for what they believed, inciting a sit-in in the middle of Tate's office.

"We refused to leave, he threatened to expel us, but we still refused to leave," Sanders said.

The sit-in sparked a major uproar all over campus. After five hours of negotiating with SMU officials, the students were met by a mob of people, including students, police and the FBI. No matter the reactions, Sanders as well the rest of the group knew that they were fighting for what they believed was right.

"We had support of some students and some were against us," Sanders said. "It didn't matter to us. We were determined in our goals."

Today, SMU offers a variety of diverse curriculums and activities, including ethnic studies as well as the Association of Black Students under the SAMSA organization, all of which would not have been possible without Sanders and the brave group of 33 students who took a stand against inequality.

"The fact that we did that really had less to do with what was going on with us at the time," Sanders said. "It had more to do with you, because we knew that one day you would be here."

The lasting impression of Sanders and the small group of black students who gathered in Tate's office continues to inspire students of today.

"Nowadays I feel we're comfortable where we're at," 2010 SMU graduate Virginia Brook said. "To see somebody who sparked change and wasn't afraid, you don't see that very often."

Sanders wanted to help change SMU for the future, not herself, something she urges others to continue.

"You will never make a greater impact than when you act on behalf of another person," Sanders said.

Brother Lonnie Williams co-edits and publishes book




"Remembrances in black: Personal perspectives of the African American Experience at the University of Arkansas, 1940s – 2000s" is the title of a book recently published and co-edited by Charles F. Robinson II and Brother Lonnie R. Williams.

With the admittance in 1948 of Silas Hunt to the University of Arkansas Law School, the university became the first southern public institution of higher education to officially desegregate without being required to do so by court order. Other students would follow in Silas Hunt's footsteps, and they along with the university would have to grapple with the situation. Remembrances in black is an oral history that gathers the personal stories of African Americans who worked as faculty, staff, and of students who studied at the flagship institution.

These stories illustrate the anguish, struggle, and triumph of individuals who had their lives indelibly marked by their experiences at the school. This book illustrates how African Americans navigated both the evolving campus environment and that of the city of Fayetteville in their attempt to fulfill personal aspirations.

Adams was selected because of his achievements and expertise in the area of protein biochemistry. The feature article highlighted some of Bro. Adams's biographical information and accomplishments as a scientist at the University of Arkansas-Fayetteville. Bro. Adams was proud to have the chance to mention our beloved Omega Psi Phi Fraternity during his interview with ASBMB when asked about some of his non-science related interests, as well as being able to mention a distinguished brother who was also a chemist, Bro Dr. Percy Julian (Omega Chapter) as one of his heroes in chemistry. In addition, he was able to mention one of the recent books he had recently completed included "The Black Apollo of Science: The Life of Ernest Everett Just" by Kenneth R. Manning. His photograph and a link to his University of Arkansas website was also listed on the MAC website for one month. Since the one-month January 2011 feature, Bro. Adams's profile has been maintained via a permanent link in a list of all other featured scientists on the ASBMB website at the link noted above.

Kudos also go to Bro. Adams for recently being invited this past December to serve as a member of the Editorial Board of the Journal of Analytical and Bioanalytical Techniques (JABT) (www.omicsonline.org). The journal is an international, peer-reviewed journal that publishes scientific articles on a wide variety of techniques with respect to the subjects of analytical & bioanalytical chemical techniques. It is also an important goal of the journal to provide a rapid turn-around time for reviewing and publishing, and to also disseminate articles freely for research, teaching and reference purposes on the internet. Bro. Clarence Hill is a recognizable name at the Dallas Cowboys Stadium



Arlington, TX - Although he wears a uniform of business casual rather than shoulder pads and cleats, and he carries a pen and pad rather than a football, Hill has still managed to make a name for himself among Cowboys fans.

Hill is the Cowboys beat reporter for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

"I used to joke that one day I would be playing football in Cowboy Stadium," said Hill, 45. "I didn't realize my dream of playing for the Cowboys, but I did get to work at Cowboys stadium."

Hill, who has been covering the Cowboys since 1997, is the longest tenured reporter in the Metroplex to cover the team.

This feat is just one of many that Hill has accomplished throughout his reporting career, one of his earlier achievements having occurred in 1995 when he became the Victoria Advocate's first black reporter.

"I knew I was the only black person working there, and I was probably the first as far as writers were concerned, but I didn't feel out of place," Hill said. "It was a good place for me to go."

Hill's first foray into journalism began in high school.

The Schulenburg native wrote a sports column for his high school newspaper, The Shorthorn. Writing about sports came easy to Hill, who had grown up running track and playing tennis and football.

"Like most little boys in Texas, I wanted to grow up and be a pro-football player," he said. "The Cowboys back then were my favorite team."

Hill enrolled at The University of Texas-Austin in 1983, where he originally pursued a degree in business.

"I realized I couldn't crunch numbers for the next 20 years of my life," said Hill, as he described the epiphany that led him to switch his major to journalism. "I realized (journalism) was my calling."

While in college, he pledged Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and worked at The Daily Texan, the university's newspaper, covering UT football, as well as the Austin-American Statesman, covering high school sports.

"I was able to pursue a career in sports without having to play on the field," he said.

Hill's first official reporting job came in 1989 when he took on a position covering sports for the Kansas City Star.

After a few years on the job, however, Hill said he became disillusioned, resulting in him leaving his job to pursue other endeavors.

Just like what happened years ago, though, Hill missed reporting and was once again drawn back into the business - this time at The Victoria Advocate.

"I thought it would help me as a writer doing news there," said Hill, who worked as a county government



and health reporter. "They really supported me and tried to help me become a better writer."

Some of the biggest stories Hill reported on while at The Advocate included a controversial column on Juneteenth and a jail escape.

Also, he won an Associated Press award for his coverage of 17-year-old Albert Yancey, who was charged with murder.

While at The Advocate, Hill made a long-lasting impact on his co-workers.

"I enjoyed working with Clarence at the Advocate," said Victoria Advocate sports reporter Mike Forman. "He was a hard worker and had an infectious personality. I had no doubt that he would be successful in this business."

Hill left The Advocate after 10 months to once again pursue a career as a sports reporter.

He landed at the Fort Worth Star Telegram in 1995, covering high school sports.

Two years later, he was covering the Cowboys.

For Hill, the job has been an eye-opening experience.

"Seeing behind the scenes of football is almost like seeing how sausage is made," said Hill, who has been in attendance at every Super Bowl since he started. "The other side of the game and the athletes is not always pretty."

Additionally, the changes within the journalism industry over the last 27 years have also been challenging to deal with.

"We've all had to adjust. Coming into the 21st century, blogging and tweeting has become a part of the job," said Hill. "It's part of the business. If you want to stay in it, then you have to get with it."

Eventually, Hill said he would like to transition into becoming a full-time sports columnist, but for now, he is happy with reporting from the sidelines.

"You may not always realize the dream you set out to reach, but if you go to school and work hard, you can get your dream job so to speak," said Hill. "Covering the Cowboys is the No. 1 job in newspaper. I wouldn't do anything else."







Brothers,

I did not receive any submissions from brothers for a Brother's heart so i decided to bring back one of my Basileus notes that I wrote for OGG a few years ago. I believe that this is still relevant to brothers today. We were just entering the current recession when this was written. I lightly address one issue and go into full detail on another. We are professional college educated men surviving in a world not designed for us to succeed; we need all the friends we can get because we have far too many enemies to not have to worry about the people closest to us.
