BROTHER GORDON MORGAN RETIRES; FIRST BLACK PROFESSOR AT UNIV. OF ARKANSAS

Brother Dr. Gordon D. Morgan, initiated into Tau Sigma chapter in 1950 at Arkansas A. M. & N. College, now the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, announced his retirement from the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville in September 2012. Brother Morgan attended the university as a graduate student from 1954-1956 and returned as its first black tenure track professor in 1969. Not only was he the first black faculty member hired at the University of Arkansas, he was also one of the first hired at any predominately white institution in Arkansas.

Brother Morgan was one of the persons credited with the creation of the Gamma Eta undergraduate chapter in 1974 at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UA, F). He was also a member of the group that relocated the Upsilon Chi graduate chapter charter to Northwest Arkansas in 1989.

Brother Morgan has been a scholar and researcher publishing numerous books, monographs, plays, and articles over his career. Brother Dr. Morgan taught in the Sociology department and even now in retirement still teaches one course on "Whiteness". His last book published was in 2011 and fittingly was, *Sixty Years a Que* by Scarith/New Academia Publishing.

To show their appreciation for Brother Morgan's service to the Fraternity and the African American students that he and his family have supported, mentored, and advised at the University of Arkansas throughout their tenure in Fayetteville, the alumni brothers of Gamma Eta, members of Upsilon Chi, and brothers who have come through the University of Arkansas from other chapters, donated funds to present Brother Morgan with a Life Membership in the Fraternity. This presentation occurred at the University of Arkansas' Black Alumni Reunion in April 2013 in front of the audience that truly benefitted from his presence at the U of A. In addition, the Black Alumni Society of the university presented Brother Morgan with an award as well. Brother Dr. Lonnie R. Williams, charter member of the Gamma Eta chapter and Arkansas State Representative – North, made the presentation from the brothers and also presented the award from the Black Alumni Society as he was the founder of the institution's Black Alumni Reunions. Brother Dr. Paul Adams, faculty member at the UA, F, advisor to Gamma Eta and Vice Chairman- International UG Advisors Committee, presented a resolution from the International Advisors committee and the Ninth District Advisors. More than 20 brothers were present and standing with Brother Morgan during the presentations.

ADAMS NAMED TO NATIONAL FELLOWSHIP PANEL U OF A CHEMIST WILL REVIEW APPLICATIONS FOR NATIONAL GEM CONSORTIUM

Upsilon Chi Chapter of Northwest Arkansas - FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — Paul Adams, an associate professor of chemistry and biochemistry at the University of Arkansas, has accepted an appointment to review 2014 fellowship applications to the National GEM Consortium.

As a panelist on the 2014 GEM Judging Committee, Adams will review applications and attend the committee's meeting in Alexandria, Va., in November 2013. Adams is in his seventh year on the faculty in the J. William Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences and he has been recognized by a national organization for his work.

This past summer, Adams was selected for the 2013 Presidential Award for Excellence in STEM Research and

Mentoring by the National Organization for the Professional Advancement of Black Chemists and Chemical Engineers (NOBCChE).

The mission of The National GEM Consortium is to enhance the value of the nation's human capital by increasing the participation of underrepresented groups (African Americans, Native Americans, and Hispanic Americans) at the master's and doctoral levels in engineering and science. The consortium has been recognized as the nation's only graduate education program exemplary at "deepening and diversifying the nation's technical talent pool."

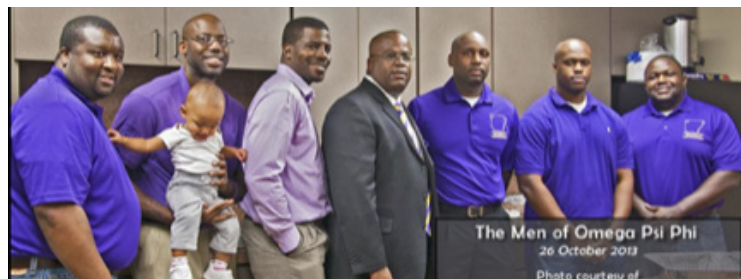
The National GEM consortium's fellowship programs span the entire recruitment, retention and professional-development spectrum. The group's principal activity is the provision of graduate fellowships at the master's and doctoral levels coupled with paid summer internships. GEM also offers programming on the importance of graduate school and tools for access and successful matriculation.

Fraternally, Brother Adams is a member of the Upsilon Chi Chapter of Northwest Arkansas, advisor to the Gamma Eta Chapter (The University of Arkansas-Fayetteville), 9th District Council Undergraduate Advisor Overseer for Arkansas, and vice chairman of the International Undergraduate Advisors Committee.

(HSU) in Arkadelphia, AR, interned in the Electrical Engineering Department at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville. A Summer Research Assistantship awarded by the Arkansas Science and Technology Authority (ASTA) made Bro. Jasper's experience possible. A senior Physics major at HSU, Brother Jasper's task was to create two projects highlighting the principle of electromagnetism as an energy source. Through vast literature research, as well as guidance from faculty and staff mentors in the College of Engineering at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, the Electromagnetic Air-Cooled Ring Levitator or "EARL", and the Pulsed Electromagnetic Acceleration Ringer/Launcher or "PEARL" were designed and demonstrated by Brother Jasper and his undergraduate research colleagues to showcase the use of electromagnetic radiation as a source of energy from concept to working model within five weeks. The levitator and the launcher were built completely by Brother Jasper and one other undergraduate student researcher in the engineering laboratory of Engineering Researcher Mr. T. A. Walton. A poster competition was held at the conclusion

of the program in July 2013, amongst all research participants, and Bro Jasper's project finished 3rd out of 15 projects, clearly demonstrating his contribution to Omega's 2nd Cardinal Principal. In addition, Brother Jasper was pleased to be subsequently notified that, during the upcoming school year, the apparatus his team designed will be exhibited at K-12 grade schools throughout the state of Arkansas to hopefully spark the interest of students toward science, technology, engineering, and mathematics fields of study.

Brother Jasper was very thankful for this experience, and felt blessed by the opportunity to study under the guises of interdisciplinary disciplines including electrical engineering, physics, and mathematics to complete his research. During his summer studies, he met and interacted with several key faculty/staff members in the College of Engineering at the University of Arkansas who provided insightful dialogue and advise to Brother Jasper so much so that he has begun to consider graduate studies in Engineering/Physics.

Although Brother Jasper spent many of his days and nights engulfed in Physics/Engineering research, he still found time to “Work Hard” for Omega as a visiting brother in the Northwest Arkansas community by assisting the brothers of the Gamma Eta chapter (The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville) and the Upsilon Chi graduate chapter at the 2013 Northwest Arkansas’ Juneteenth

Celebration in June. As a part of this celebration, Brother Jasper joined the undergraduate and graduate brothers in supervising inflated attractions for the kids, managing a voter’s registration table, and other event-related events that were sponsored by the Northwest Arkansas Juneteenth committee.

BROTHER HONORED FOR EXCELLENCE IN STEM RESEARCH AND MENTORING NATIONAL ORGANIZATION RECOGNIZES DR. PAUL ADAMS WITH NATIONAL AWARD

Fayetteville, AR - — Growing up in southeastern Louisiana, Brother Dr. Paul Adams never considered becoming a professional researcher. He planned to become a doctor. “I did go to medical school for a year, but that’s when I thought about research as a career,” said Adams, an associate professor of chemistry and biochemistry at the University of Arkansas. Adams stuck with academia, and he is in his seventh year on the faculty in the J. William Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences — and now he has been recognized by a national organization for his work. In September, Adams was notified that he had been selected to receive the 2013 Presidential Award for Excellence in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Research and Mentoring by the National Organization for the Professional Advancement of Black Chemists and Chemical Engineers (NOBCChE). “In getting a Ph.D., and running a research laboratory, I knew

there were very few people in my field who looked like me, because minorities have been traditionally underrepresented in STEM disciplines,” Adams said. “Others have stressed to me that I can be seen as a role model. But I’ve never tried to relish in the fact that I am an African-American scientist. I’ve tried to relish in the fact that I am a scientist who happens to be African-American.”

The award honors those who have achieved excellence in scientific research and who have also maintained a steadfast commitment to developing future scientific leaders in the “STEM” fields of science, technology, engineering and math. “To have my peers at the National Organization for the Professional Advancement of Black Chemists and Chemical Engineers recognize me in this manner — not only doing good science but also considering me an example for what students coming up behind me are capable of achieving — it’s a surreal feeling,” Adams said.

Adams’ research focuses on Ras proteins, which have been identified in nearly one-third of cancer cell types. He believes that these proteins have unique structural aspects, which, in part, may play a role in causing cells to continue growing, a behavior that is a hallmark of cancer cells. By creating chemical differences in different parts of the protein, Adams and his research team hope to learn more about how the proteins work and affect the cells. That information can then hopefully be used to assist drug design efforts to that target the specific protein and stop the cancerous behavior. “We’ve published four papers directly related to the research and we had a collaboration that resulted in two more papers,” said Adams, who since coming to the university in 2007 has received more than \$1.5 million in funding from the National Science Foundation, National Institutes of Health and the

MU TAU CHAPTER RECEIVES CITY OF MONROE'S COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD

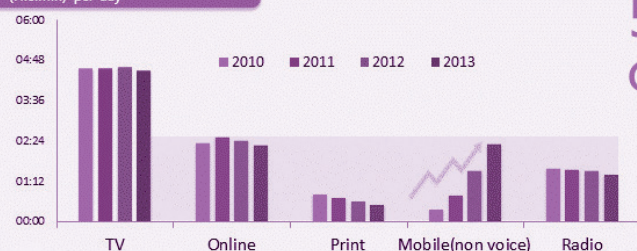

ALPHA DELTA EPSILON BROTHER HELP SAVES A LIFE AS A SOUTHEASTERN ATHLETIC TRAINERS

Hammond, La. – In the world of collegiate sports, the athletes and their coaches are given most of the limelight. The stories of their hard work, dedication, victories and defeats are told on a daily basis. But there is a certain group in Lion Athletics who are right alongside the athletes and coaches, all working towards the same goal – to win. They are the Southeastern Athletic Training Staff.

With their home base located in the Dugas building near Strawberry Stadium, Southeastern's athletic trainers ensure the health and well-being of every athlete. Whether it's healing injuries, administering physical therapy, or providing pre and post-practice treatment, they are available to the Lions around the clock. But after the events in Lake Charles this past Saturday, two AT's proved that they can even save lives.

Matt Reynolds and Walter Smith are a part of Southeastern's AT staff. Currently assigned to cross country and track & field, they accompanied the men's and women's teams to the McNeese Cowboy Stampede on Saturday.

During a charity run prior to collegiate competition, they helped perform life-saving procedures on a collapsed runner; ultimately reviving the man from a non-responsive state.

"At a track or cross meet, people collapse all the time – simply because they're exhausted," said Reynolds. "But when a crowd started to form, we knew something was going on."

CPR was performed on the fallen man by a few volunteer firefighters, as well as Danielle Davis, an ATC from McNeese State. After a few agonizing minutes, the CPR was proving to be unsuccessful, as the man was not responding. In a moment of quick-thinking, Smith ran to grab an AED.

"AED stands for 'automated external defibrillator,'" said Smith. "It reads your heart rate. The one we used was the on-site machine. When I saw they weren't using it, I ran over and got it."

Once the AED was available, Reynolds prepared the machine to read the man's heart rate. After the pads were placed on the runner's chest, everyone's fear was confirmed: the man's heart was not responding.

"At that point, his heart had no rhythm," Reynolds said. "He was dead. So I knew then that we needed to shock him."

After receiving shock and CPR for almost ten minutes, the man finally regained consciousness. Besides being a bit confused and disoriented, the fallen runner began to breathe on his own and respond positively. Reynolds and Smith both admit to being nervous, but they never faltered in their successful efforts to save the man's life.

"I was a bit freaked out," said Reynolds. "But when the AED read that his heart rate was back to normal, that's when I realized I did exactly what I was trained to do."

Reynolds, who graduated from Southeastern in May with a bachelor's degree in Athletic Training, is now certified and working as one of the program's graduate assistants.

Smith, who is a senior in Southeastern's undergraduate athletic training program, was a member of the Lions

football team. But after the 2011 season, he decided to dedicate his time to athletic training.

"When he woke up, that was definitely the realest moment for me," Smith said. "I knew then that 'Wow, I just helped save a life.'"

Reynolds says the runner has spent the past few days in the hospital and is stable. He believes that what he and Walter did not only attests to their abilities as trainers, but to the program as a whole.

"A lot of people think they know what athletic training is, but they really don't," said Reynolds. "We don't just hold water bottles and put bags of ice on sore muscles. We're trained to save your life if you're ever in that situation. What happened on Saturday showed just how much we can do as trained medical professionals."

Over the years, some of the nation's best athletes have worn green and gold. Their triumphs can be seen throughout our university's history, and still continue today. But now, more than ever, the success of any Southeastern athlete can also be credited to a group of passionate and dedicated individuals: the athletic trainers of Southeastern Louisiana University.

OMEGAS PROVIDE SERVICE TO ESTABLISH COMMUNITY GARDENS

Assisting from the SU Ag Center were County Agent Brother Terrence Marshall, and Extension Associate Stephanie Ellwood.

The fraternity members constructed fences, built container boxes and garden plots, planted vegetables and flowers, mowed grass, and did other beautification projects. Gardens worked with includes: The Garden of Champions; The Stump of Hope; From the Bottom to the Top; and Avira's Rainbow Community Gardens. The Baton Rouge Garden Alliance, Ms. Ollie Doucette, Ms. Sharon Terrace, Ms. Aldremer Smith, and Ms. Marva Coleman, Coordinators, were the beneficiaries of this community service effort.

KEY Points of the Summit:

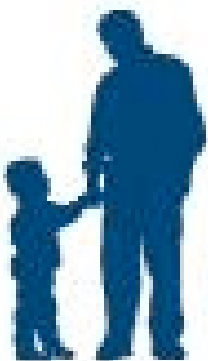
- Gave a message of Faith that Fathers are important, they are valued and needed in their families and communities.

- Over 50% of the High School drop outs come from fatherless homes
- When a father is active and engaged it increases the education of the children. It keeps young men from jail and prison, joining gangs and becoming young fathers.

President Obama's White House Fatherhood Meeting Initiative is based upon 4 concepts:

- 1) Public Awareness on the important role Fathers play in the families and community
- 2) Collective Partnership – How to work collectively as a community and country to increase the value of fatherhood and close the gap
- 3) Advisory – Hope to have private funding
- 4) Celebrate and Uplift – we need to uplift so fathers and men who are doing the right thing. Have program and activities that cultivate fathers.

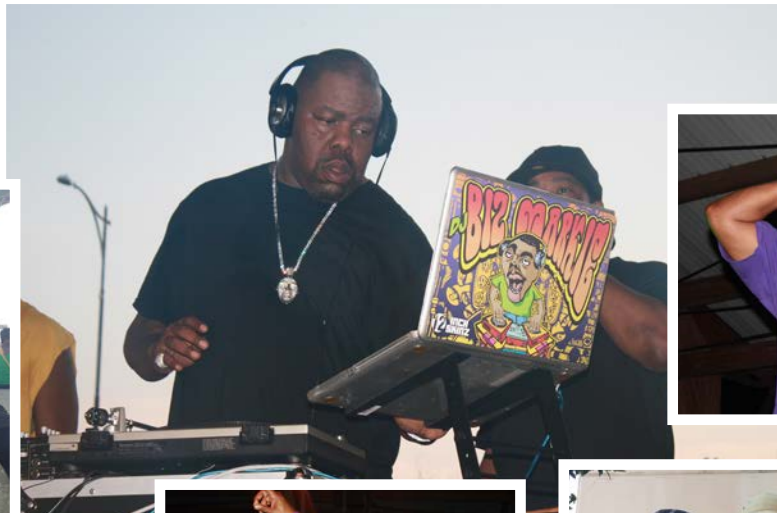

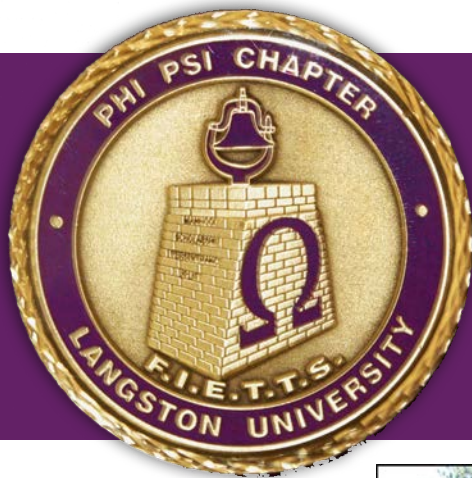
WALKING FOR A CAUSE

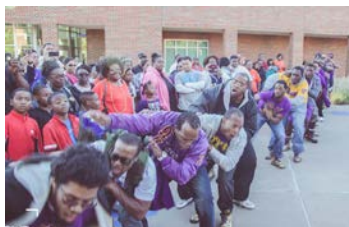

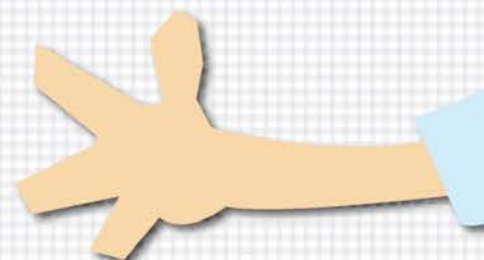

LEAD TO ISOLATION:

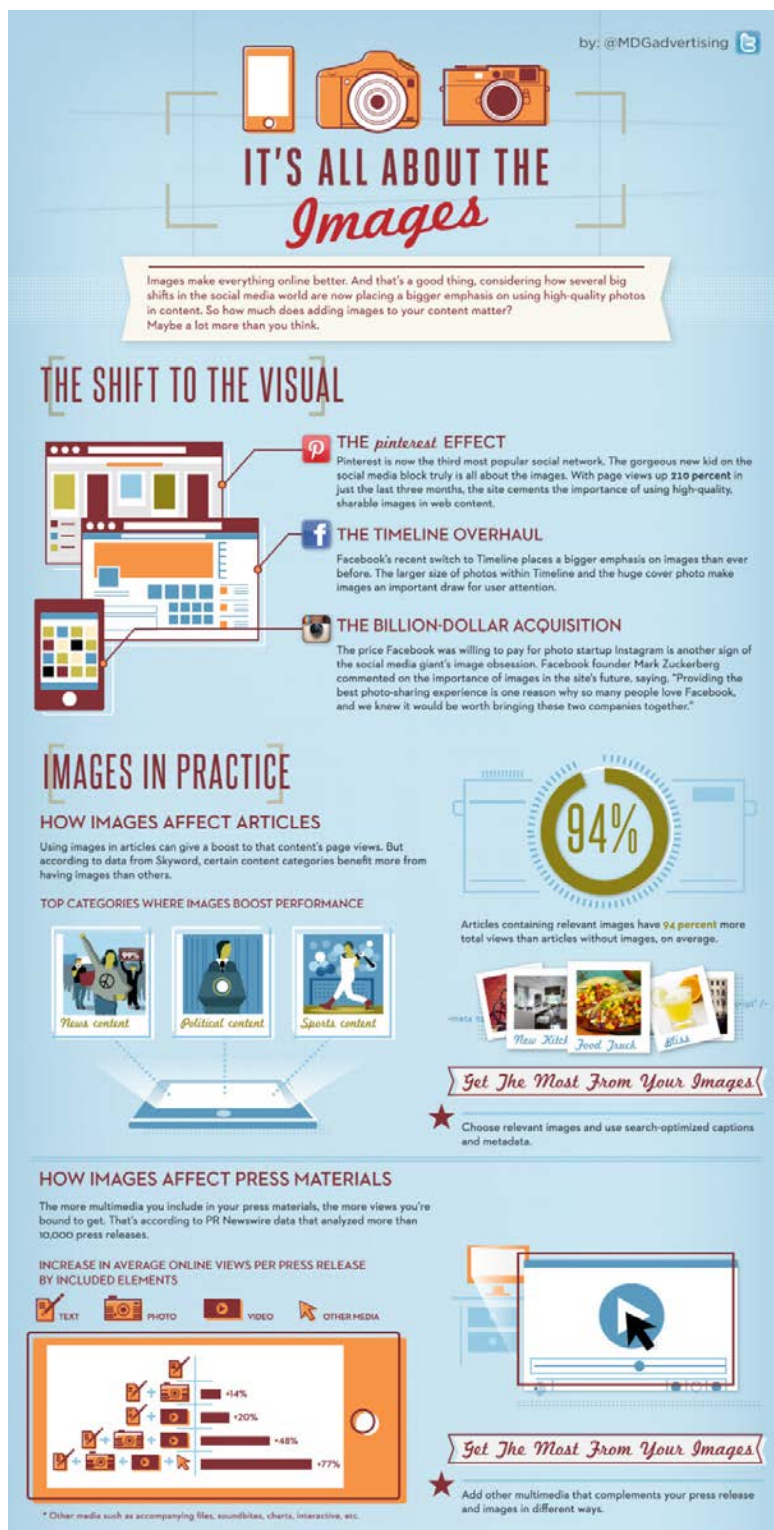

New technology products have become available that allow social networks to be blocked, but their effectiveness remains spotty.

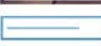
Engagement Rate With Facebook Posts By Type

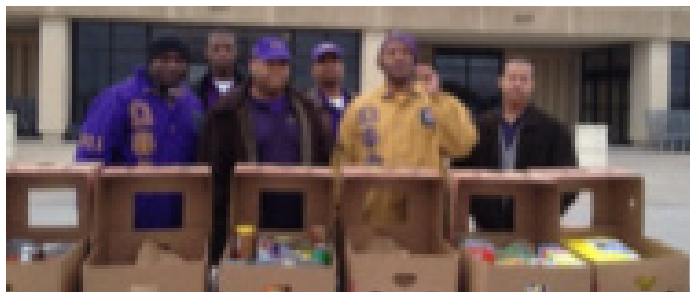

POST MSP FAMILY DINNER

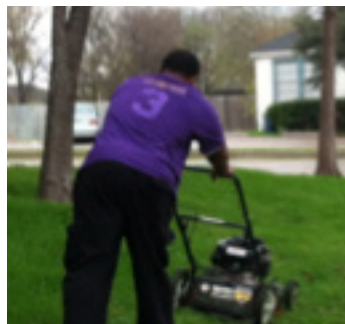
