






#### Omega Man Receives Military Medals after 70-Year Wait

Brother Fulton Walker, Tau Phi Chapter, Pine Bluff, Arkansas, served in the U.S. Army during World War II and was awarded the medals earned during the war more than 70 years after his discharge. Walker now 97, went on to earn a bachelor's and master's degree and was the second African-American to be appointed principal in an all-white school in Arkansas. He received the Good Conduct Medal, American Campaign Medal, European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with three Bronze Service Stars, World War II Victory Medal, Marksman Badge with Rifle Bar and Honorable Service Lapel Button World War II from U.S. Senator John Boozman during a February 2020 Ceremony honoring him.

Senator Boozman said Fulton Walker was deployed to England, France, Germany and other places as a driver in the Red Ball Express, whose job was to transport supplies that had arrived at the docks to the front lines, driving mainly at night to avoid enemy aircraft. Almost 75% of the soldiers assigned to the Red Ball Express were African American. In addition to the medals, Walker also received a flag that had flown over the U.S. Capital in Washington D.C. and a letter from U.S. Senator Tom Cotton. Pine Bluff Mayor Shirley Washington designated February 28 as Fulton Walker Day in the City of Pine Bluff.

#### Xi Rho COVID-19 Project






#### **Carwash Scholarship Fundraiser**

Law Enforcement & Criminal Justice Reform

A few ideas for comprehensive reforms that can establish fundamental accountability within the law enforcement and criminal justice systems include:

- 1. Creating a publicly searchable database of law enforcement who engage in misconduct involving discrimination and loss of life, in support of the creation of a Lifetime Nationwide ban from Law Enforcement when terminated for misconduct:
- 2. Requiring public disclosure of all complaints against Law Enforcement.
- 3. Creating Law Enforcement national standards for:
  - A. Recruiting
  - B. Culturally Competent Training and outlawing racial profiling in policing.
  - C. Use of Force, and banning the use of chokeholds or other actions that restrict airflow to humans.
- 4. Requiring independent investigations of all allegations of Law Enforcement misconduct, including stipulating that all officers involved in incidents that are discriminatory or that result in loss of life immediately undergo an assessment, to include a toxicology exam.
- 5. Ensuring Law Enforcement accountability by ending the use of qualified immunity.
- 6. Training to recognize, and requiring law enforcement to intervene when other officers are using excessive force.

We should be tired of watching people protest with no results. Clearly, we need significant changes to Law Enforcement accountability, and people willing to work together to affect that change.

Bro. Peay (Business Operations): "COVID-19 has changed the way I perform business operations at work. As the Chief, Plans & Programs Branch for a Contracting Division, we have been forced to work from home as well as me leading from home. I had to adopt different methods, such as daily Zoom Video conferencing to put eyes on my workers and know they are doing well. Approximately 80-90% of all communication is non-verbal so this method allows me to keep the pulse of the worker. We have also had to procure devices, which allowed for the ability to still award over \$500M in contracts — not missing a beat. Furthermore, some of my workers have experienced different forms of depression so we've conducted several social distancing events to include two virtual lunches."

Bro. Varner (Business Operations): "On a professional note, as I practice medicine, it has forever changed with personal protection equipment (PPE) and the global race for COVID-19 vaccines and treatment. Using telemedicine to evaluate patients, making a diagnosis, reviewing lab/imaging studies, and making referrals to specialists. Some patients are adapting to the change and some prefer the traditional way of provider-patient encounters."

Bro. Peay (Church Operations): "As far as the church, I was asked to facilitate a Zoom discussion on August 1st on the topic of My Brother's Keeper — Helping a Brother When They're Going Through It. It was a 2-hour discussion and 35 men were in attendance. Brothers really needed it during this time of Pandemic."

Racial Inequality, Policing, and Legal Rights

On August 12th, 2020, the Alamo City Omega Lamplighters (ACOLL) of Psi Alpha Chapter conducted a virtual forum on Racial Inequality, Policing, and Legal Rights. The panel was moderated by Bro. Derek Morton, ACOLL Chairman, and Bro. Nathaniel Jenkins, of Psi Alpha Chapter. Panelists included Officer Doug Greene from the San Antonio Police Department, Councilman Noah Washington (06-Lambda Iota), Place Two of Selma, Texas, and Attorney at Law, Bro. Lionel Richardson (96-Alpha Theta). In attendance with the Lamplighters were mentees from Psi Alpha weekly mentoring program, a host of Omega Men, and other guests. After introductions by the Lamplighter President Azarel Hardeman, Vice-President Devin Wallace, and Ashton McGhee, the mentees were asked a series of questions and polls so the panelist could get a feel for the mentees. Have you ever been detained by a policeman, falsely arrested, and witnessed police brutality? Is everyone looked at equally? What areas of racial inequality have improved and not improved in your life-time? These are a few questions they were asked.

The mentees then asked realistic situational questions they have or may experience to the three panelists that provided a perspective from their lens. Each panelist provided candid responses that these young men of color needed to know during these complicated times. Lamplighter Micah Sewel asked the question about being questioned and searched at school versus in public by a policeman. Attorney Richardson responded by explaining the concept of "in loco parentis" in which staff at schools takes on the responsibilities of a parent when the child is in the school's care. Minors have limited rights, in a school setting, to avoid searches and questioning by the school staff and security. However, if local police arrive at school or a similar situation occurs outside of school, minors do not have to subject themselves to searches or any questioning without a parent or probable cause if a crime has not been committed. Further discussion of showing identification when asked, safety during a traffic stop, minor rights, and actions by city leaders for better relations in the black and brown community are other topics that motivated the forum. Councilman Washington stated that since the George Floyd murder, Selma, in coordination with neighboring cities, has reinforced policing policies and has strongly promoted community policing and engagement with citizens. Closing remarks by Basileus Jimmie McMillion encouraged mentees to always be respectful and pay attention to their surroundings. The knowledge provided will be useful in making the right decisions in situations discussed in the forum.

Carl "JJ" Johnson Obituary

Born October 1, 1946, Carl S. Johnson, affectionately known by many as "JJ", was a native of De Ridder, Louisiana. He was the son of Beatrice Merritt and Joe Johnson. He attended George Washington Carver Elementary School from 1st through 5th grades. He then attended Holy Rosary Institute in Lafayette, Louisiana, graduating in 1964. After graduation, he studied and graduated from Commonwealth College of Mortuary Science (Houston, Texas), receiving a degree in Mortuary Science, with certifications as an embalmer and funeral director. Shortly after graduation from Commonwealth, JJ was drafted and began his career in the United States Army in January 1966. In the Army, JJ served in every enlisted position (E1-E9). His duties were many and varied to include: Supply Sergeant, Cadre/Drill Sergeant, Platoon Sergeant, AAMED Instructor, First Sergeant, Hospital Sergeant Major, Troop Command Sergeant Major (Brigade Sergeant Major).

A critical time during JJ's military career revolved around his tour of duty in Vietnam. He was shot in the right arm by the enemy. The bullet traveled from his arm and lodged in his back, very close to his spine. Because of the threat of paralysis, this bullet was never removed. Due to the injuries sustained in Vietnam, JJ spent months in the hospital and endured numerous surgeries. In March 1968, then Sergeant Johnson, was authorized to salute left-handed as a result of wounds received in combat, thus making him the only soldier in the U.S. Army to have such an authorization in his era. JJ relocated to his hometown of De Ridder, Louisiana and re-enlisted into the US Army at Fort Polk, Louisiana. Shortly after his re-enlistment, he was assigned to Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, Texas. A true "hometown" romance evolved and on December 21, 1968, JJ and Frankie were married. To this union, the couple was blessed with three unique, talented and loving children.

After 26 years of military service and having achieved the highest possible enlisted rank, Command Sergeant Major Carl "JJ' Johnson made the decision to retire. At this point, his military assignments included: \*Ft Polk, Louisiana, \*Viet Nam, \*Ft. Sam Houston, \*Germany, (two terms-Aschaffenburg and Heidelberg), \*Ft. Eustis, Virginia, \*Hawaii-Tripler Army Medical Center.

Awards Received: Silver Star; Purple Heart; Good Conduct Medal; Gallantry Cross; Vietnam Service Medal; Combat Medic Badge; Vietnam Service Medal; Medical order of Military Merit.

Understanding that education was the key to success after retirement, JJ completed a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Management from Wayland Baptist University. JJ's employment after retirement included the following: \*Cemetery Representative (Department of Veterans Affairs at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery); \*District Command Sergeant Major (ROTC-San Antonio Independent School District). Although the Army and other employment obligations consumed much of JJ's time, he carved out time to officiate basketball, volleyball and boxing. He officiated basketball for over 35 years, to include AAU, high school and college. He was the first Black president of the local basketball chapter. In boxing, he officiated such notables as Little Dan "Red' Lopez, Tommie "Hitman" Hearns, Larry Holmes, "Sweetpea" Whitaker and local favorites, the Ayala Brothers. Being the grandson of a Baptist preacher and the son of a "prayer-leading" mother, JJ grew up in a faith-filled home. After his grandfather's death, the family became devoted members of Star of Bethlehem Baptist Church in De Ridder.



JJ's church home in San Antonio was Second Baptist Church where he was faithful and active as a sound system operator and a member of the Male Chorus. He also enjoyed working with the Second Baptist Center Committee. One of the greatest joys of JJ's life (other than being a husband, father and grandfather) was becoming a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. In his 24 years as a member, with Frankie in tow, he attended all district meetings, conclaves, and everything in between. In Psi Alpha Chapter, he served as the Keeper of Peace and Protocol Chair. On the district level, he served as Chair of Protocol for the following District Representatives: \*Brother Todd Clemons (2004-2007, \*Brother Willie "Mercenary" Hinchen (2007-2010), \*Brother Shawn Brewer (2010-2012), \*Brother Ernest Parquet (2012-2015), \*Brother Dr. Kenneth Terrell (2015-2018),\* Brother Patrick B. Smith (2018-2020). In 2018, JJ received the Ninth District's "Superior Service Award". In 2019, he was recognized with a plaque from Brother Harold Bailey, 1st Vice 9th District Representative," In recognition and sincere appreciation of many years of distinguished service as Ninth District Protocol Chairman".

JJ could always count on Brother John Cooper and Brother Greg Thompson to get him into "Good Omega Trouble"...Involvement!!

On any given Monday, Thursday and Saturday, JJ could be found at one of the area golf courses. He was a member of San Antonio Minority Golf Association and River City Golf Association. Many San Antonians remember JJ's strutting horse, Shelly. The two rode in many parades, most often participating with the Bexar County Buffalo Soldiers where he was a member for over twenty years. For the past few years, JJ was given the opportunity to volunteer at Lewis Funeral Home. Thanks to Mrs. Lois Washington, owner and pillar in the community, JJ was able to utilize some of his mortuary skills and work with a great team at the funeral home. This brought him great joy.

The whistle has blown! No more parades, no more tallying golf scores, JJ has said his last goodbye!! He departed this life on September 11, 2020 and went to meet departed family, referees, golf buddies and old special friends. He was preceded in death by his parents, Beatrice Merritt and Joe Johnson; step parents, Milton and Mable Bryant and his brother, William T. McGhee. He leaves to cherish his memory his devoted wife, Frankie, of 18,876 days; sons, JJ Johnson (Austin, TX); Kerwin (Christine) Johnson (Schertz, TX); daughter, Jade Johnson Mayfield (Schertz, TX); Sisters: Sharon Bryant (Houston, TX); Dell Merritt Smart (Atlanta, GA); Anna Marie Bryant Evans (Houston, TX); Emma Bryant Marbley (Houston, TX) Grandchildren: Ayana Cenobia Johnson (Willingboro, NJ); Neesa Grace Johnson (San Antonio, TX); Jonah Maddox Johnson (Schertz, TX) Londyn Grace Johnson (Schertz, TX); Phoenix Carter Johnson(Austin, TX); AND a host of relatives, (in laws, nieces, nephews) friends and fraternity brothers. 




**Voter Registration at Peaceful Rally**

This motion received a unanimous vote by the Supreme Council and inevitably led to the birth of the Mu Mu Nu Chapter (#963).

From humble beginnings with 28 determined Charter Members in 2016, and with a vision to grow organically from brotherhood and friendship, the Mu Mu Nu Chapter since that time has experienced unprecedented growth as a new chapter.



### Chaplain's Corner-MANUP!!!! From Asriel Gamaliel McLain

Chaplain, Ninth District of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.

It is enough to make a man cry, this year 2020. The year was numbered right as when we think of 2020 we think of perfect eyesight. And the events of this year we have been forced to deal with some ugliness that may not have been perspective to the naked eye. We have had to dealt giants that have cast dark shadows across the landscape of civilization such as racism, overt and systemic, economic downturns, and one that strikes without any notice for it is hidden to the naked eye, its voice is not heard with the ear and has no smell nor sense of touch—COVIC 19. This giant has infected about 29 million people as of the writing of this article, with between 6 and 7 million Americans sick and almost 200,000 deaths.

How then do we handle these giants? The answer is heard in one word MANUP. To see what is necessary in standing up to the crisis that besets us one but look at the match up of David and Goliath. On the surface it was a mismatch—a young man taking on a nine foot giant. The giant has the weapons of war at that time and all David had as sling shot and five smooth stones, but the Bible tells us "Another one bites the dust".

First, if we are to manup and face the giants of our age, we that giants are a fact of life. Notice verse 24 of 1 Samuel 17, "And all the men of Israel, when they saw the man, fled from him, and were sore afraid." There is no avoiding their presence: Giants are with us as we see their shadows and hear their footsteps in our communities in the form of gun violence, miseducation or no educaton, economic and racial inequality to name a few. Life it must remembered is not a picnic ground, but a battleground, a struggle in which we must vigilant, in knowing that God is bigger than any giant that hell can send forth.

.Yes, reality says giants are here, though they cause us to tremble as did the army of Israel when confronted by Goliath for while they are awesome they are unknown. And moving away quickly from that which is a threat to life, limb, or property, fulfills that ole expression, "Self-preservation is that first law of nature. Yet in order to uplift a broken humanity, giants have to be faced, that is one must "MANUP", not relying on the flesh or earthly resources on Him and His power, remembering in mind these words of the Apostle John, in his first letter to the church at large, chapter 4, verse 4: You are of God, little children, and have overcome then: because greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world."

In meeting those challenges, which seem so large and powerful as if to dwarf us, remember our big elder brother Jesus the Christ is willing and able to help us and aid us as it says in the letter to the Hebrews, chapter 2, verse 18: For in that he himself hath suffering being tempted (or tested) he is able to succour (or aid, help) them that are tempted.

If you decide to fight, make sure that you know you are, having it together inside so you can be together on the outside. Many a man before he could advance in uplifting others, had to be sure who he really is allowing God to confirm his identity or change that identity, just as Jacob did when he wrestled with God and had his hip thrown out socket and it name changed. This is somewhat like riding an airplane when the stewardess tells us that if pressure is lost, oxygen will fall, but before you take care your small child, put yours on first. Before you be used to uplift others, have a healthy sense of self, not having an identity crisis of you are. But remember, people will often misunderstood your faith in the Lord and belief in yourself, not as confidence but as arrognace. Notice the response of David's brother to his fearlessness in I Samuel 17, verse 28:

And Eliab his eldest brother heard when he spoke unto the men; and Eliab's anger was kindled (or he was furious) against David, and he said, "Why did you come here? Who is taken care of the few sheep in the wilderness? I know your pride and the naughtiness of your heart; for you came down to see the battle."

The world frowns on an optimistic Christian, one who perseveres is seen as cocky, arrogant, or stuck-up.. It is not that we are full of pride, but we are filled with his power and the blessed assurance that he will keep his promises. Thus we can say in unison with Paul in the Philippian letter, chapter, 4, verse 13: I can do all things through Christ which strengthens me.



Remember that the world often at first boos, ridicules even seeks to destroy those who persevered in to fulfill their dreams for the uplift of mankind, then years celebrating, blessed and rejoiced in their achievements: Martin Luther King, Jr. Roy Wilkins, Rosa Parks, Fannie Lou Hammer and others were condemned as outside agitators, troublemakers, even communists for demanding America live up to its ideals for all, and stop letting the American dream for some while being a nightmare for others, realizing the moral question that answer of which is to use the words of President John F. Kennedy, as "as clear as the Constitution and as old as the Scriptures." Yet today if even hint at being insensitive to people of colors and creeds, you by and large will be denounced as a bigot or at least what you did is rooted in bigotry.

The Wright Brothers were taught nuts to dream of invented a machine, that was heavier than air, for travel. Yet any destination on this planet is hours away whereas it was days, weeks even months away.

Finally, if you would MANUP, and defeat giants do three things:

One, face them head on!!!! Here is a picture of confession, as the word means to agree with. When we confess our sin we admit sin is wrong. When we confess Christ, we agree with God on what he says about them The way to recovery is to admit that one needs healing. Two, use stones. And stones pictures Jesus for he is that rock not only on which to build hope but he is that rock which if thrown at any giant will bring him down. Three, use the sword. Notice David cuts of Goliath's head. It is the sword of the Spirit, The Word of God that defeats any enemy. Four, when one MANUPS, when he conquer giants, when overcomes any obstacles, you can move forward more turf for the Lord as well as the betterment of mankind. One victory leads to another and to another and then to another and so forth. MANUP though you may be the only man that takes a stand, living out the words of a song by Sly Stone from the 1970's known as STAND.


