Williams was appointed the interim vice chancellor on June 19, 2020. "During his six months as our interim vice chancellor, Dr. Williams served admirably and provided valuable leadership during a challenging fall semester," Damphousse said. "I discussed the permanent position with him in December, and I am pleased that he has agreed to accept the appointment. I am looking forward to his ongoing input and counsel as a member of our Chancellor's Cabinet. Williams joined Arkansas State in 2003, and previously served as associate vice chancellor for student affairs before joining the Chancellor's Office in 2017 as special assistant to the chancellor. He holds four degrees from the University of Arkansas and worked there for 27 years prior to coming to Arkansas State.



He was an assistant vice chancellor for student affairs in Fayetteville from 1991 until 2003. While at A-State, he was honored by his alma mater with the Silas Hunt Legacy Award from UA in 2009 and has had a leadership award named in his honor by their Black Alumni Society in recognition of his work in support of diversity and inclusion. Brother Williams serves as the Arkansas State Representative for the Ninth District, is a Life Member of the Fraternity and the Ninth District, is a member of the Upsilon Chi chapter and was initiated through the Pi Omicron chapter as a charter member of the Gamma Eta chapter, Fall '74.




Xi Rho Saving Lives By Bro. Derrick Sykes / Xi Rho / West Memphis, AR.

Brother Paul Adams Achieves Rank of Professor! By Bro. Lonnie Williams / Upsilon Chi / Bentonville, AR

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (U of A), opened its doors in 1872 with James McGahee, African American, as one of its students. There is no record of any other African American attending the institution after McGahee until Silas Hunt in 1948. The first African American professor was not hired until 1969, Brother Dr. Gordon D. Morgan (Omega chapter).

The progression of promotion for faculty at higher education institutions begin at assistant professor to associate professor (in most case with indefinite tenure/employment) then to (full) Professor and in special occasions university and/or Distinguished Professor. In the history of the University of Arkansas, preliminary research indicates there may have been less than 10 African Americans to reach the rank of professor. Congratulations to Brother Dr. Paul Adams on this outstanding achievement of being promoted to professor in the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry in the J. William Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences and becoming the first African American to do it within the science fields at the U of A and earlier than most have achieved this rank!

Dr. Adams arrived at the U of A in January 2007. Since his arrival at the U of A, Adams has excelled as an advisor and mentor for over 70 graduate, undergraduate and honors students, many of whom came from historically underrepresented or low-income communities and is the former advisor to the undergraduate chapter of Gamma Eta. He also teaches in the interdisciplinary cellular and molecular biology program. His research and scholarly activities have garnered more than \$3 million in funding from the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, the Arkansas Biosciences Institute, the Arkansas Science and Technology Authority, and the Winthrop P. Rockefeller Foundation. He is also the recipient of many awards among which is the 2019 Minority Access National Role Model awarded by Minority Access Inc.

Brother Adams is member of the Upsilon Chi chapter in Northwest Arkansas, is a Life Member of the Fraternity, and was initiated into Omega Psi Phi through the Theta Kappa chapter (Spr '89) at Louisiana State University. He presently serves as the 9th District Undergraduate Advisor, Vice Chairman, International UG Affairs and Chapter Advisors Committee for the Fraternity. He is married to Dr. Stephanie Adams (Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. ) who in February 2021 began a new role at the University of Arkansas as the new director of Faculty Affairs within the Office of the Provost. They are the parents of three children.

Fifth Circuit Judge, Brother Carl E. Stewart, Sr., recently delivered the fall keynote address for Notre Dame Law School's Program on Ethics, Compliance & Inclusion. The virtual event was co-sponsored by the Law School's Black Law Students Association. Themes of inclusion and using one's opportunities to benefit others were prevalent in Judge Stewart's address about his life and career in law. Brother Stewart told students about the path that took him through a trailblazing career that has led to 26 years on the Fifth Circuit. That path also included serving as a captain in the United States Army as part of the Judge Advocate General's Corps, and a federal prosecutor for the U.S. Department of Justice. He also served as a Louisiana trial court judge and as an appellate judge for the Louisiana Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit, in Shreveport, Louisiana. In 1994, then-President Bill Clinton appointed Brother Stewart to a newly established seat on the Fifth Circuit. He was the first African American to serve as the Fifth Circuit's chief judge, a position he held from 2012-2019. Brother Judge Carl E. Stewart, Sr. is a Lifetime Member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated, a Past Ninth District Counselor (1985-1986), and a Past Basileus (1983-1985) and current Parliamentarian of the Rho Omega Chapter. In 2017, Brother Stewart received the International Omega Founders' Lifetime Achievement Award.

The panelist selected provided a candid perspective from their era (1950's to 2021) of the Civil Rights Movement based on where they were raised. for equality and their role in the movement. Opening remarks by Derek Morton set the tone that some of the dialogue in the forum may create feelings of anger, but he asked Lamplighters to channel their emotions to further fuel their purpose in life. It is evident that the Civil Rights Movement then has only a few differences now, i.e., peaceful protesters are not being water-hosed down or attacked by police or dogs. Before the panel started, the Lamplighters took a poll on whether they believe there



is a conspiracy to destroy Black and Hispanic boys in America. Surprisingly, six percent of the Lamplighters stated yes. The conspiracy discussion was based on the criminal justice system, on-going systematic racism, and inequality. The Lamplighters asked some tough and interesting questions to the panelist that, in some cases, took their emotions back to a very uncomfortable time. These few questions and others created applicable dialogue for the Lamplighters and the Omega Men. Lamplighters realized much work is still to be done for equality and their role in the movement. They understand the debt we have accumulated from people who have lost their freedom, career, and life so we can have equal and basic human rights. The movement must continue to move forward by their actions to repay those debts.Basileus George Mayers' closing remarks encouraged Lamplighters to "take advantage of these history lessons presented to them. Understand the relevancy of yesterday as you build on your tomorrow. There are always opportunities to take advantage of the negatives shared and create a more positive you."

Brother Brandon Logan, a 2005 initiate of the Gamma Gamma chapter and member of Psi Alpha chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated, continues to make inroads in



the black community not only as Founder and CEO of Urban Capital Partners but now as an Executive Producer. Brother Logan is Co-Executive Producer of the documentary, "Living In My Skin" which chronicles raw and heartbreaking stories about what it is like to be a Black man/boy in the city of San Antonio. Thirty-three Black males, ranging in the age from 10-90, tell stories they seldom share with people outside their race. The two-part documentary aims to create a

deeper understanding of race relations in our community and foster a deeper cultural understanding of each other's lives and feelings. In a recent interview with KENS5 news, Brother Logan explains that the documentary came about with a sign. Lionel Sosa, a world-renowned

artist, was out for a walk with his wife and four dogs when he saw something in a storefront. "You can't be anti-racist unless you're actively anti-racist." This sign spoke to him and spurred him into what would become "Living In My Skin." The Black population of San Antonio is only 7%, yet it hosts the largest MLK march in the nation. Additionally, 63% of our citizens are Hispanic, making us a majority-minority city. Many perceive San Antonio to be culturally enlightened and highly evolved. But is it? Brother Logan recalls a memory from his childhood, when he was called the n-word by a police officer, as a pivotal moment in his own story. "That was the moment that I realized there was much more to my story that I didn't know about. So, it is important, considering the times we're living in now, to be intentional with raising the conversation around the Black male experience," Brother Logan said. "The ugliest underbelly of America is rearing itself. And there is a real fight for the soul of this country.



And that is why I thought it was important for us in San Antonio to identify men from varied backgrounds to share their story." "Living In My Skin" does not stop with just a documentary. An art exhibit is available for in-person viewing and virtually. Currently, the exhibit is available at Frost Tower lobby through the duration of February before moving over to Weston Urban Park for outdoor viewing. ### Miller Child Development Center Toy Drive By Bro. Tony Godbee / Psi Alpha / San Antonio, TX







Psi Alpha Remembers Veterans Day 2020 By Bro. Scott L. Earle, Sr. / Psi Alpha / San Antonio, TX

We must show our heroes their respect because many have forgotten the sacrifices they have made. Any Chapter in Omega can look at the roll of Omega Chapter from their Chapter and look at the local Veterans Cemetery and find many members that served during WWI, WWII, Korea, Vietnam, The Persian Gulf, etc. Psi Alpha Chapter turned 80 on November 1st and when we went to pay respect to 2 of our Charter members, we decided to find out how many more Brothers were Veterans buried at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery. In 10 days, we received many names of Brothers that members assumed had served and from that list, we verified 23 names and found their military records and where they were buried. Psi Alpha has a rich military history and we found that members had received the Purple Heart and were Former Prisoners of War. The US Army, Army Air Corps, US Air Force, US Navy, and the US Marine Corp were all represented by our Chapter heroes. The Brothers who served in WWI and WWII served in segregated units and the Brothers in those wars although degreed served as enlisted except for Brother Dr. William V. Hurd who was trained at Fort Des Moines but returned to Meharry to teach and placed in the US Army Reserve Dental Corp as one of the first Blacks to ever earn this honor and was never activated to Active Duty because of the concerns of the Government due to the case in which a White soldier might need medical care and they did not want to face those issues so after being trained and earning the rank of 1Lt he was returned to civilian status and never served a day of Active duty and taught dentistry throughout the War. Stories such as these are sad but was a reality for our Brothers. On November 11, 2020, Vice Basileus Brother John Lester and Historian Brother Scott Earle represented the Chapter and visited the graves of 4 fallen heroes. The first grave we visited was that of Past Basileus, Brother CMSGT Billy Fair who retired from the USAF and served in Vietnam and the Persian Gulf. Brother Fair was very active in our Chapter and passed away while serving as the Psi Alpha Basileus. While at his grave we spent several minutes sharing stories of the American hero. The next grave we visited was of Brother SGT Warren Harding Eusan who served in the US Army Air Corp as Tuskegee Airmen during WWII. Brother Eusan taught the Navigators how to read and use their navigation and communications equipment and too many test flights to certify them before they were allowed to earn their Navigator title. Brother Eusan became an Omega man at Wiley College, Theta Chapter in 1939. He was active in Psi Alpha from the 1940s until he died in 2014 and was a proud Red Tail who was active with other retired Tuskegee Airman until his death. We recalled story after story of the man who mentored both of us and spent hours sharing his life as an educator and veteran that touch both of us profoundly. The next grave was of Brother SFC Hubert Hawkins who served in the US ARMY during the Korean War where he was an Ex-POW who returned to combat during the Vietnam War and was awarded the Purple Heart. Neither of us knew this hero but after researching his life we felt this Brother must be visited. During the Korean Conflict/War, he was a Prisoner of War. Brother Hawkins honorably served his country and retired from the U.S. Army as a non-commissioned officer (Sergeant First Class). Afterward, he attended St. Phillip's College and Southwest Texas University and earned a B.S. degree. Brother Hawkins' work experience was broad, i.e., Economic Opportunities Development Corporation. Via Transit Company, San Antonio Housing Authority, and Beyar County Appraisal District ment Corporation, Via Transit Company, San Antonio Housing Authority, and Bexar County Appraisal District. Brother Hawkins was initiated into Psi Alpha on July 23, 1977. The last grave we visited was of Brother CSM Carl JJ Johnson who served in the US ARMY during the Vietnam War and received the Purple Heart. Brother J.J. is affectionately known as "Hook" passed away on September 11, 2020. This visit was extremely hard, his tombstone was freshly laid and the time spent at his grave was one of storytelling and fond memories. In the Army, JJ served in every enlisted position (E1-E9). His duties were many and varied to include: Supply Sergeant, Cadre/Drill Sergeant, Platoon Sergeant, AMEDD Instructor, First Sergeant, Hospital Sergeant Major, Troop Command Sergeant Major (Brigade Sergeant Major). A critical time during JJ's military career revolved around his tour of duty in Vietnam. He was shot in the right arm by the enemy. The bullet traveled from his arm and lodged in his back, very close to his spine. Because of the threat of paralysis, this bullet was never arm and lodged in his back, very close to his spine. Because of the threat of paralysis, this bullet was never removed. Due to the injuries sustained in Vietnam, JJ spent months in the hospital and endured numerous surgeries. In March 1968, then Sergeant Johnson was authorized to salute left-handed as a result of wounds received in combat, thus making him the only soldier in the U.S. Army to have such an authorization in his era. After 26 years of military service and have achieved the highest possible enlisted rank, Command Sergeant Major Carl "JJ' Johnson decided to retire. At this point, his military assignments included: \*Ft Polk, Louisiana, \*Viet Nam, \*Ft. Sam Houston, \*Germany, (two terms-Aschaffenburg and Heidelberg), \*Ft. Eustis, Virginia, \*Hawaii-Tripler Army Medical Center. JJ received many awards; Silver Star; Purple Heart; Good Conduct Medal; Gallantry Cross; Vietnam Service Medal; Combat Medic Badge; Vietnam Service Medal; Medical order of Military Merit. Many San Antonians remember JJ's strutting horse, Shelly. The two rode in many parades, most often participating with the Beyar County Buffalo Soldiers where he was a member for over parades, most often participating with the Bexar County Buffalo Soldiers where he was a member for over twenty years. Brother JJ loved Omega Psi Phi was a Life Member who was initiated through Psi Alpha in 1996. Brother JJ held positions at the local and District level and was beloved in his role of Protocol Officer who kept all Brothers in line showing us the right way to conduct business. Brother JJ will be remembered for his catchphrase of "Hello" which could mean many things, but it always broke the ice and bought a smile to all whom he met. Veterans Day must not just be a day off but a day to reflect and show honor and I implore all Chapter Historians to investigate the Omega Roll of your Chapter and start a Chapter tradition where the graves of Omega heroes are visited.

All three are seniors at Sam Houston High School. Govan and Reese have been in the Weekly Mentoring Program since their time at Davis Middle School in the 6th grade while Williams has been affiliated with the program for the past two years. Govan will be signing a letter of intent to attend Blinn Junior College in Brenham, Texas on Wednesday, February 3<sup>rd</sup>. Multiple junior colleges and universities are looking to sign Reese and Williams. On January 31, 2021, The Weekly Mentoring Program hosted a Juvenile Justice Jeopardy™ (JJJ) forum. Juvenile Justice Jeopardy™ (JJJ) teaches youth how to navigate interactions with police and peers, understand the legal consequences of their actions, as well as strategies for desistance from peer pressure to engage in risky behavior. The game also teaches youth the short- and long-term legal consequences of having an arrest and court records. Additionally, the "Strategies to Youth Training" looked at reducing contentious encounters between police and youth, and the unnecessary detention of worth for mineral of the state tention of youth for minor offenses, and disproportionate policing of children of color. Mentee Dorian said, "It was very informative and helped him think about the type of people he is around. He really understands now that he can basically get into trouble by just being around someone even though he has done nothing wrong. Juvenile Justice Jeopardy will help me to be more careful." Mentee Josh stated, "I learned about different rules. I also learned about what can happen to your record and how parents can have your records erased. I learned you can petition your record to be erased or have your charges dismissed. It was fun because I knew more than I gave myself credit for knowing." Mentee JQ said, "What I got out of the game is how to navigate interactions with police and peers to understand the legal consequences of my actions. I also got out of the game the short and long-term legal consequences of having an arrest and court records. Finally, I learned more about the police's jobs and the differing an arrest and court records. Finally, I learned more about the police's jobs and the difference between a search and a pat-down." The last mentee Ashton who was recognized by the Executive Director Mrs. Lisa Thurman, Officer Joel Pope, Coach Quincy Stewart and Brother Robert Clark (Retired FBI Agent) as a Future Attorney and was lauded for his thinking capacity. Ashton stated, "I think that the Juvenile Justice Jeopardy game was beneficial and insightful. The law enforcement officials did an outstanding job of expounding on the law and giving us (the youth) clarity on any questions that we may have had. I believe that more programs like these should be present because the quickest way to a death bed is ignorance. The meeting was also very structured and organized; however, what else would you expect from the Brothers of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc." The majority of response received from the students were providing homes for the homeless and decreasing the unemployment rate by providing more jobs for the people. Fatherhood Guidance from Brother Herbert Nance Interviewed By: LeMarc Holcombe and Alan Thompson Written By Bro. Jeremy Neal / Psi Alpha / San Antonio, TX

Brother LeMarc Holcombe: How long have you been a member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated?

Brother Herbert Nance: I have been a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. for 52 years. I crossed the sands on 26th April 1968 at Huston-Tillotson College in Austin, Texas. I was deuce, #2. The line name was "The Determined Six Minus One." We started with six and they took one of our line brothers over early. We were online from September-April, they took him over in December. He tried three times before and had three calamities in his life, but he made it the last time. 52 years coming up on 53 years. The wife is 6 months ahead of me; she went over in December and has 53 years in her sorority next month.

Brother LeMarc Holcombe: How many children do you have?

Brother Herbert Nance: I have 2 children. I have a daughter, Charlinda. The name is unique because I just knew being a coach, I was not going to have a girl, I was going to have a boy. My first was going to be a boy and we did not even think. I fought my wife because I did not want a kid named after me, which I do have a son, Herbert Charles Nance, Jr. Charlinda was born in El Paso, Texas on 27th December, which was 3 days before my birthday. At the last minute, we decided just in case it was a girl, we would come up with something unique. She is named for four people. We took my middle name, which is Charles, and took my wife's name which is Linda, and combined them to get Charlinda. My mother-in-law's name was Audrey and my mother's name was Alice so we put A-U-D-L-I-C-E, Audlice was her middle name and the last name was Nance. I do have a grandson as well, Charles Lee Allen, III.

Brother LeMarc Holcombe: During the early years and still today, do you have sincere, consistent, and effective communication with your children?

Brother Herbert Nance: Yes, unfortunately, I tried to get them to move away from home. I raised them as my mother raised me. At 18, they had to go somewhere but they could not stay here. My daughter went to Prairie View A&M University and spent 4-years there on a scholarship, graduating early. She went to medical school (Optometry) at the University of Houston. The son, believe it or not being a big-time coach at the time I was growing up, I thought I was going to have a linebacker or defensive end. He ended up being an opera singer. He went to the University of North Texas, which was then known as North Texas State University, for two years and transferred to the University of Texas at Austin and graduated from there. That was a school back in his day that I could not even enroll in. They both live here, my daughter in Universal City and my son lived in San Diego for 12 years but recently moved back close to home two years ago living in Bulverde, Texas.

Brother LeMarc Holcombe: What is your proudest moment as a Father?
Brother Herbert Nance: Well, let's see, of course, the proudest moment with my daughter was the day that she graduated from medical school. And we went to hear the speech and the

professor that gave the speech at that time made a statement that she still does not realize today. But he said that because of the initials in front of your name, you will be respected and, you know, whatever you say will have more virtue or more value than just a regular person. And he said, well, you will be a doctor. She is a Doctor of Optometry. With my son was the idea, the same thing, you know, seeing him graduate from the University of Texas at Austin, a school that when I didn't even think about applying and when I went to Huston Tillotson, which is in the same city, we could go over and use the library and buy books at UT, but we couldn't stay over there for night activities or anything unless we were taking a class and oddest mum was to see him finish his goal. He transferred and we thought for a minute, I was going to have to put my foot where it did the most good but he got it straight and he decided to go ahead and finish. So, he graduated UT Austin, and I do not know what they fed him up there, but you know, he's one of them hook 'em horn die hearts. But those were the two proudest moments with my children.

Brother LeMarc Holcombe: What has been or was your biggest challenge as a Father?

Brother Herbert Nance: I was raised by an 8th-grade graduate. My dad, my mother divorced when I was like four. So, I went in between a split home and my mother was the smart one. She went and forced, the little town of Taylor, Texas to admit her into a nursing program. My dad worked for BF Goodrich. And so, I had to try to tie the two together. My mom pushed education. My dad pushed it too in a way that he could only say, you know, show me by example. With my children, it was just getting them to understand and we used to have things going on in this house that you can do anything you want to. We used our daughter's initials C.A.N. Charlinda Audlice Nance telling her that she could do anything you want to do. That is all you do is look at your name. You can do what you want to do. And we passed that onto my son. And another way that I got them to buy into it, I was going to show you my picture. My motivation from graduating from school was the fact that I have a picture of myself in a cotton field when I was 12 years old, pulling cotton. That is when the polaroid first came out, I have got it here somewhere in my room on a pile of desks. And I used to show that to them and say, if you do not put something in your head, you will work with your back. And if you do not be careful, we will revert to this. I also have another little snapshot, they messed up my picture. I did not get a picture when I graduated from college, but I did get one when I completed my master's degree here at the University of Texas-San Antonio. So, I show them to show them that, to show that my mantra was, I went from the cotton fields to college. (Break)

Brother Herbert Nance: And the darndest thing was when I was at Tillotson from '65 to '69, I had a nightshift, and I ran out of money. I did not know what a scholarship or a semester hour was any of that. I am the first in the family to go to college. And so, I had to learn the hard way. My freshman year after my first semester, my freshman year, I was ready to drop out because I did not have any funds. And that is how we will talk about Omega in a minute, that's how Omega pulled me through, but I did not know what to do, etc. So, I went to work at Travis State School for the mentally retarded from April 1, 1966, to July 29th, 1969. I worked ten at night till six in the morning. I left my job and went to the campus to my room. And I had to decide if I wanted to take a quick nap or eat breakfast and went to class from eight to 12, we had Vesper from 10 to 11. I get to nap. I went from eight to four. I went to bed after I ate at 430. I got up at 830 and went right back to work. Did that for three and a half years. And took 21 hours!

Brother Alan Thompson: With everything that is going on with police brutality and racial injustice, what advice do you give to your children?

Brother Herbert Nance: We had to talk, especially with my son, and the reason we had to let me just go with what we did. I grew up in the fifties when I was a teen you know, a young kid in the fifties. It was still in that little town of mine at eight, nine o'clock you could not be uptown unless you had a purpose. On the sidewalk, if you came facing a white woman, you had to either bow down or step out to the side. Okay? With the police, it was, they would stop us and harass us for any little things. So, we knew how to duck and dodge and not get into it. What I told my son, especially now I told my daughter the same thing. If you are stopped by the police, do not be combative, do not say anything. Follow the instructions. If you can get a badge number, an eyeball, or something, put something in your memory but I just want you to come home. And we had that talk. And it is a shame we are still having that talk today because I am telling my grandson, who's nine years old, he will be ten next Monday. And I'm having to tell him the same thing, but this brutality, I, you know, and, and I can understand the frustration of you young folks because we've been saying, it's going to get better, I'n have been saying that for 50 years and it is still granted, it is slightly better.

But the thing of it is not where it should be. So, police brutality breaks my heart. I try to be a Christian. I try to live by the scriptures and, and it says the meek shall inherit the earth and blessed is the peacemaker. But then that other little side of me says, I am going to keep this 38, 25, 32, and shotgun near my bed. Yes, it affects me. Even at my age, it does, it takes a little bit of my heart away, you know because that could be one day my grandson, I hope he never has to face it. My son was stopped one time on the way to Denton. And when he was going back to North Texas State and he was staying with my mother-in-law who was in Fort Worth. And when he got to the campus, he called us, he was, he was shaking. He was crying. And naturally, you know, the other side of me came out and I was ready to load up and go up. But again, I just told him, you at home, I mean, it is a campus, you are safe. And I have that issue because we have a young man that is in my Sunday school class, he is a policeman. He works the night shift and we have been praying for him. And, and you know, not all cops are bad, but there is a lot of bad images that we see today.

Brother Alan Thompson: The Psi Alpha Chapter Fatherhood Initiative Committee focuses on the 4 F's (Faith, Family, Fellowship, and Friendship) when conducting mentoring/training. Out of the 4 F's, which one is most important to you and why?

Brother Herbert Nance: Right now, my faith, I have to have strong faith that things will change. I have to have strong faith that, that it is just going to get better. And, and I like friendship. My wife teases me. I've never, I have never met a stranger. My mother raised me that way. My dad was a little bit tougher. My dad carried a hook blade because he cut rubber. And he said this will cut flesh too. I practiced a little bit of him for a little while until you know, but, you can win more people if you have faith in yourself and faith in God, then you can win and make more friends. And that is it. And that our faith has kept us together. If we live to see March the 20th of 2021, Linda and I will have been married for 50 years, the big FIVE-0. And it is hard to pick one of those out faith, friendship, family. We did things with my family. You know, I am ex-military. I did not realize it but see, my dad never talked to me about World War II. He was in World War II. And every Saturday morning, when I stayed with him, he called it A and B (Area Beautification). And I said, what the hell is area beautification? Every Saturday morning, we got up cut the yard, swept the house, cleaned the house. And that was, you know, what brought us together and both sides of my family. We had family meals. So, friendship, family, faith, and the other one? Fellowship! Oh, I love the fellowship. You know? I have gone from, and, and some of the brothers, I do not want to let too much of my secret out, but God is a miracle worker. I was the brother that if you did not have some Rum and Coke, well, I was gonna let you see that other side of me. But I lost that. You know? And then I got kind of fancy and I started, you know, with Lowenbrau, and I could not drink Franklin's stuff. Yessir, Lowenbrau! When I worked for the government on St. Patrick's Day, we had a competition with two tables to see who could build the pyramid with the bottles. But fellowship to me now is a whole different meaning. I like talking, I do not talk to people as if I am higher or any lower. Communication is one of the things I am good at.

Brother Alan Thompson: As a Father, what tools do you possess to create a strong family component (or unit)?

Brother Herbert Nance: The ability to not always think I am right. And that is very important. In my early years with my kids, as they grew up, I did take the dictatorial route. You know, I am the head chief here! No, it was I am the HNIC, that was my term. But then as they grew older, I had to understand that this is a two-way street. And so, one of the things we did here in this house is Friday was for some reason, my dad, I got it from my dad. Friday was fish night. So, I would fry the fish and put it on the table, and we would sit down, and we would talk. And we would talk about what happened this week. What is going to happen next week? And anytime that the kids had a problem, they had the right to call a family meeting and we would have a family meeting. We, we thought that was so crazy for the black family, you know, back then, because you know, black people don't talk, they, you know, shut up, you listen. And I talk, but we would have family meetings. I think that is why I cannot stand either one of them today because they are headstrong, but we taught them to be strong in themselves and believe in themselves. And if there is a problem, you know, you got to try to talk it out. But yeah, that is one of my tools was being able to give my wife and I used to say, is it is a 51/49, uh, you know, percentage. But, in the interim, we got to meet it to 50 and that is something we had to learn.

Brother Alan Thompson: How do you think we can break the cycle of absentee Fathers?


Brother Herbert Nance: The Fathers have to know, I had to learn this. Not the hard way, but the old slavery mentality and my dad kind of broke that with me. I got six sisters total and my dad had 3 wives.

I'm the product of his second wife. But he used to tell this third batch that Liam's here now. Now girls keep your draws up. Boys, try to get your draws down. But as he matured, then I understood that was it. My dad became a deacon and it seemed like another light bulb clicked off. And that's what it boiled down to. And so he says, you gotta believe in yourself and, and don't get, you know, when on the run, you know, he said, man, back in the days in slavery, if the man came after you, you had to run or either die. But with the family and see the family nucleus wasn't that strong because they were in control. Now as a man, you have to understand that you have responsibilities, and to break that cycle, you have to be responsible for yourself and others. It's not all about you. It's going to require sacrifice. I've sacrificed a lot. I, to this day, my wife and I, you know, I think the kids understand I had a chance, I was in civil service and I was a GS 11 and I had been offered a GS 12, 13 at Wright Patterson Air Force Base. At the same time, my kids were in AP classes and my wife was in an administrative program to become a principal. And I had to make a choice. Do I uproot everybody because of the \$1200 or \$1,300 and the potential, or do I stay here and man up? I stayed here and I caught a lot of flack, but the bottom line is I'm secure in myself to know that it worked out for me. Two college graduates, a doctor and a principal who just retired after 43 years of work in the district. What would happen to me? I don't know. But again, I caught a lot of heat. One other quick story, in 1984, we ran for the school board out here at East Central and my wife and I sat at the table and flipped a coin. And she won. And I thought, I'm the man, I should be the one running she said, but baby, we flipped the coin. And I won. I said, okay. So I slowly gave the kids a chance, vote for Linda Nance. And man, I caught heat from the brothers, believe it or not, my brothers. Man, we know who wears the pants in that house. We know who does this, we know who does that. I say, listen, it's about family. It's about togetherness. I say you know what? And since then, and, and another thing, this we've been married, this woman has always made more money than me. She's smarter than me. So I ain't chasing that. I got what I want the bank accounts in my name and her name. I control the money. She doesn't even know what she makes today. You know? No, but see, the thing was, you know, as a father, as a, as a man, when I made that union, you know, and I said, it didn't work with my kids. So that didn't work with Charlinda, you know, she got a divorce last year, but the thing of it is when you, yo, you gotta find a real man. And that's the key. And as, as we are real men, can't listen to him. You know, I always say, if you not paying any bills at 2942 Lakeland, if you're not contributing to the grocery bill, you ain't got nothing to say about this house.

Brother Alan Thompson: Give some words of encouragement/uplift for a Father trying to resurrect his relationship with his family (kids)?

Brother Herbert Nance: Be humble. Go in, be humble. If, if it's, if it was a nasty break or if it's been a rough road, be willing, take the sensitivity off your skin, listen to what it's saying, evaluate it. Don't take it personally. It's going to hard. I still think when I, when I was talking to you about all that stuff, see, I haven't had a beer since 1992. I haven't had one beer since 1992, because my family said, "When you get when you a little bit away from us like that, we don't know who you are." And that broke my heart. That broke my heart. So what I had to do was look at him, look at the man in the mirror. And I had to come to a point where I said, look, this, what am I? What's wrong? Why am I? And I had to figure me out. And that's when I opened a good book and started reading First thing I read was Psalms 34:8, which says "O taste and see that the Lord is good. Blessed it as a man and trust them." So my curiosity got me in, I went one or two chapters over 37:5 which says, "Commit that way unto the Lord trust also in him. And he should bring in the past." That's why I can put up with y'all for 50 some years. Cause you know, y'all are, y'all just wait, y'all go run into some brothers. How did he get in? That's the thing. But with the family, you got to focus on the fact that I always said, my wife, laid down and had two kids for me. And I was a medic in the military. I delivered two kids. I know what it's like. And for her to do that for me and us, then I have to do whatever I can to keep her happy and to please her. And she'll tell you, right now it bugs me sometimes. I was a Ferdinand, the bull, I was a Rose man and everything and did all that. Vietnam put a little kick in my, my arm. You know, when I got back from Vietnam, I was a little bit sour. But as a father trying to reconnect with her, we had to start all over again. I had to court all over again. You got to look at why did you pick this woman? Don't forget why she accepted you. I've seen us, but we still hold hands and I don't leave the house unless I get three smacks, you know? And she doesn't need to grab her in the back and she ain't gonna leave until she gave me three smacks. We still do that. We had another agreement and I'm through, I know you can probably get cut off, but I had another agreement. We can argue fuss and fight. But every night when we go to bed, we always touch at some time we all wrapped up like a snake and sometimes it's just our toes that touch... but we always touch and



Chaplain's Corner/Page Subject: Christ and Corvid 19

Romans 8: 28-39



At this time in the history of the world, we have endured for over a year the cold, cruel hand of this pandemic, known as the Corvid 19. It has wreaked havoc our economy as businesses have been forced to either shut down or cut back on productivity, and schools now use virtual learning for our children. Of course, it is taking a terrible toll on our health care system in that persons in the medical profession are overworked, and insurance industry is strained, paying out claims, both life and medical. Through then this nightmare that has engulfed this planet as we fight an enemy we cannot see, feel or smell, that is a terrible equalizer, not discriminating by gender, race, religion nor class, as believers, we are tempted, yes and even do ask, "Where is God in all this? And when will He bring an end to this suffering." Well, I can say, He is where he has been all the time and eternity, on his throne. But the throne is not a rocky chair, nor a lazy boy chair in our den. No, kings do not sit on thrones to rest but to rule and super rule. It must be remembered that the silence of God, especially in a time of crisis does not mean the absence of God, just as when we were children our parents would move around the house, sometimes, without a sound, but we knew they were there and ready to respond to our call.

For us to try to make sense of this crisis, we but need to hear the Apostle Paul's words to the Roman church, chapter 8, verses 28-39 as follows:

And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who[i] have been called according to his purpose. For those God foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brothers and sisters. And those he predestined, he also called; those he called, he also justified; those he justified, he also glorified.

What, then, shall we say in response to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things? Who will bring any charge against those whom God has chosen? It is God who justifies. Who then is the one who condemns? No one. Christ Jesus who died—more than that, who was raised to life—is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us. Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? As it is written:

"For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered."[j]

No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons,[k] neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

This letter was written by Paul to the church at Rome, a church he had never seen before. He pens these words to introduce himself to this congregation and seek support for a mission to Spain and to articulate his theology. This book or letter has is a theological masterpiece, and the basic Christian doctrine is taught here. And it has been called by some because of its Christ-centered world view, "The Fifth Gospel." He begins the letter by telling the sinfulness of humanity, both Jew and Gentile, with the only hope of redemption through the Lord Jesus Christ.

To those who believe he drives home the point that our salvation is complete in Jesus Christ. It cannot be undone nor revoked to all who believe as he states that for us who are justified by faith, there is no condemnation. And the idea of justification is once and for all, all time and all in eternity. The point here is not only are our sins forgiven but through the blood of Christ, he views us as if we have never sinned.

For our purposes we have the assurance that God has our backs, his grace is our posse and security. In the words of the just quoted text, nothing not even Corvid 19 can ultimately conquer a child of the king. It is interesting to know that the word Corona means "crown" as the virus seen under a microscope resembles a crown. And that virus is still trying to stay of the thrones of our hearts and minds, bringing fear and despair. Yet Paul assures us that nothing can nor will dethrone our Sovereign and Savior. Consider these truths from our text of study.

- A.) All work together for good, not they are good of themselves, but despite the ups and downs, God 's ultimately plan is to shape us character wise in the image of his Son, Jesus Christ and allowing evil to run its course to the ultimate fulfillment in Him. It is like the engine in your car. Look under the hood is greasy, yes, dirty, but remove the wrong part that looks dirty, and see how far you go?
- B.) Notice the grocery list of troubles he writes that beset humans. He declares that they may put up a fight, they may wrestle, but they will not win. Even Corvid-19 will in God's time and way, will bite the dust in defeat before Him. Evil just like Corvid-19 mutates itself to adjust its defenses against vaccines and medicines to resist. But it will still ultimately lose. If you compare, God to an athletic team, you could look at the wins column and see the victories keep adding up and, in the loss,, column is a big fat ZERO.
- C.) Because we are on his team, we win, yes more that win, as he says, "We are more than conquerors, that is we also get a bonus prize. And a bonus is something more than is expected. So it is with the child of the King, we get more than we expect as salvation is that path that shines and shines unto the perfect day and gets sweeter than the day before.

Allow me to leave this thought with you. I am not a very athletic person. I remember in high school physical education class; the class would choose sides for a basketball game. Of course, the two captains would choose the best players and that would leave us who were uncoordinated, who were classed as SCRUBS. But the coach, Robert Smith, a cousin, at Ruston High School in Ruston, Louisiana would say look at us and say to the others, "I will take them." He would call us into corner, and say, "Look just pass the ball to me and we will beat the socks off them." So we would assist him in scoring by getting the ball in his hands, and win every time. Life then, yes circumstances, sees us as "SCRUBS." We are black and male, yet by the terrible statistics, says society sees us as SCRUBS. Many of us let life play mind games on us and tells us we are SCRUBS. And you are still playing tapes and recordings of negativism since childhood in your head that you are SCRUBS. Indeed, yells from the sidelines, "Hey, SCRUBS, you can't, and you will not win."

But Coach Jesus, says, "Just give me ball and I'll do a lay-up." Remember, brothers, just give him the ball for he knows every move, every plan the enemy will make. So give him the problem, the ball whatever it is–sickness, Corvid, unemployment, divorce and marital issues, rebellious children, racial discrimination, debt, whatever it is. He is the one all in all for all with all as He died on Friday, but early Sunday morning he got up with all power in his hands. Peace and power.

- 1. When writing the story use times new roman font and 11pt size. The first line of your story should be the title in regular print no caps or bold letters, for example Brothers Uplift the Community. The Second line should be the brother who wrote it, chapter name, and city the chapter is in for example, Bro. Frank Watson / Rho Xi / Freeport, TX. The suggested length for the body of your story is between 150-300 words. Do not put pictures or graphics within the story, it should only contain words, punctuation, and characters in the format explained above. Do not combine multiple stories within one word document. See the articles within The Source as a reference for the writing format required for submissions.
- 2. Draft an email. Your email should contain word document and picture attachments. Each word document and picture must be labeled with state, chapter, and event name for example (TX-Theta Alpha- Voter Registration) so that they can be properly saved within the database.
- 3. Send your email to flwatson31@gmail.com.
- 4. You will receive a reply within 24 hours stating "Received, Thank You". If you do not receive a reply double check to ensure your email was received.
- 5. Please only submit noteworthy articles from your chapter.

#### How to submit a video for The Source TV Videocast

- 1. Record content by cell phone or tablet with the I Movie (Apple) or FilmoraGo (Android) application. Filming the video within these applications will give you edit capabilities that are compatible with what the PR Committee uses. Also, while recording content be sure your device is facing sideways because the final video will be widescreen.
- 2. Edit your video clips to create one 30 second to 2 minutes long video. Name the video file with state, chapter, and event name. (AR Phi Mu Mu Adopt-A-Highway)
- 3. Upload your video file to a google drive or i cloud folder to provide download capability.




